Forest Fires Under Control

As 4th of July vacationers flocked to woods and resorts over the week-end several small fires were reported throughout Klamath county by the Klamath Forest Protective association and the Klamath Agency fire headquarters.

Five small fires were extinguished by Klamath Agency firemen and all the fires were believed to have been man-made, according to the dispatcher. Most serious of these occurred just north of Swan lake and burned over an acre and a half before it was put out. The fire, spotted by the Swan lake lookout, was burning in virgin timber and could have been very serious had it not been brought under immediate control.

Other fires occurring on the Indian reservation were one on the west side of the Klamath marsh, one near Sprague river, apparently caused by a fisherman, and two near Chiloch. The fires near Chiloch were caused by fireworks, and a sky rocket was found in a tree at the location of one of the fires.

The Klamath Forest Protective association sent men to put out three small fires which were started during the week-end. Two fires were reported near McGowan's mill but were extinguished before any serious damage was done. A small fire was also started at the dump this side of the Weed-Asland junction. It was apparently caused by hot ashes left at the dump.

Czechs Vote To Attend Paris Meet

PRAGUE, July 7 (AP)—The Czechoslovak government decided in a closed session today to accept an invitation to the Paris conference on the Marshall proposal, despite Soviet rejection, semi-official circles said.

The decision was taken on the event of the delayed departure to Moscow of communist Premier Klement Gottwald and Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk—without waiting for results of their talks with Russian Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, the informant said.

The Czechoslovak ambassador in Paris, Jindrich Nosak, has been named representative for the Paris conference, opening Saturday, because the meeting will begin too soon for Masaryk to reach Paris on his return from Moscow. It was added, but Masaryk will take over when he can.

(This dispatch was filed in Prague at 6:15 p. m.—11:15 a. m. EST. Nosak denied in Paris earlier today a report that Czechoslovakia had "provisionally" accepted and also denied that he had been named as delegate.)

Czechoslovakia's official radio steered a middle course in its comments on action on the invitation.
