

Rodeo Prize List Proves To Be One Of The Largest

Grandstand, bleachers and fences were filled with spectators numbering over 9000 at the Klamath Basin Rodeo association's three-day 1947 western show.

Purses amounting to \$6220 were offered in events for the three days and plus entry fees of \$5360 for these same events the total amount accruing to contestants amounted to \$11,580. This amount minus \$160 was paid out at the conclusion of the celebration on Sunday night.

The \$160 held out was the day money plus the entry fees for Sunday in the five-eighths mile free-for-all race. Payment was delayed on this race due to participants contesting the decision of the judges. The dispute occurred when the race had to be re-run on account of a false start the first time, and during the half-hour rest granted Pat Hogue's rider changed horses, the other contestants using the same mounts as in the original start. Further consideration is being given this incident before the judges who named the Hogue entry as winner advise whether any rules were violated in the changing of mounts.

Financial success of the association from the 1947 show will be announced as soon as the books have been audited, Elmer H. Balsiger, president, advised today.

Portland Schools Revamp System

PORTLAND, July 10 (AP)—The school board has finally surrendered to the demands of parents who want a grade system for their children that can be understood in terms of good or bad.

The board last night authorized cards which will grade numerically, 1 for highest down to 5 for failing, for high school pupils, and ordered a study for cards for the lower grades.

A budget of \$9,767,138 was given approval by the Multnomah tax supervising and conservation commission. The board was advised its share of the state basic school support fund would be \$2,745,120.

Cave Mystery Proves Hoax

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 10 (AP)—State Safety Commissioner Lynn Bomar announced today John T. (Tuck) Hurn, for whom a week's search had been made in Nickajack cave at Shelbourn, Tenn., had been located in New York City and that Hurn's reported disappearance in the cavern was "a hoax from beginning to end."

Bomar said John Hurn never had been lost in the gloomy, bat-infested commercial cave which had been searched by the state highway patrol, the Red Cross, national guard, Boy Scouts and scores of private parties since Hurn's brother reported his disappearance.

Hollis Hurn, who with John is part owner of the cave, still insisted today, however, that he believed John was lost in the cave when he first reported his disappearance last Tuesday.

Bomar said that instead of getting lost in many-passaged, miles-deep Nickajack, John Hurn was driven to Birmingham in an automobile July 1 and boarded a train there the next day for New York.

The commission said a telephone call was received early this morning from John Hurn in New York, an hour after a statement of the affair had been obtained from an individual Bomar did not identify.
