

Collier Bill Funds Speed Construction Of Roads, Highways In California

California's new Collier-Burns highway act, providing gasoline and highway user taxes, will make approximately \$50,000,000 available to Sacramento valley counties for highway, county road and street construction during the next five years, according to George G. Pollock, Sacramento, chairman of the Sacramento valley council, California state chamber of commerce. In addition, these counties will further benefit from a part of approximately \$70,000,000 of state-collected highway construction funds allocated for state highway construction in Northern California at the discretion of the state highway commission.

"The state chamber's Sacramento valley council actively supported the new highway legislation for sound development and adequate financing," Pollock declared. "Enactment culminates a program initiated four years ago by the state chamber and other statewide civil-commercial groups."

"A luncheon meeting of the Sacramento Valley Council's highway committee will be held at the Hotel Senator July 11. Led by Swift Berry, Camino, committee chairman, the group will recommend policies concerning expenditures of the new highway funds.

"Adequate financing should permit early acquisition of rights-of-way and modernizing of many of

the Valley's major arterials, to reduce traffic congestion, accidents, operating expense and time loss. The new highway law also provides for county road and city street improvements."

The Collier-Burns highway act will raise approximately \$35,000,000 for construction of state highways during the next five years. Of this, \$18,000,000 will be allocated to Northern California—including \$7,000,000 to be spent on state highways in Northern California at the discretion of the state highway commission.

The remaining \$7,000,000 is the minimum the state must spend on state highway system thoroughfares in Northern California counties during the first five years of added revenue. Sacramento valley council members' participation in this minimum state construction guarantee totals \$15,680,150 over the five-year period, and includes:

Modoc, \$433,975; Siskiyou, \$1,250,550.

County roads and city streets also will receive additional funds through an added allocation of 1/2 cent per gallon of gasoline sales tax. City apportionment is on a population basis. Sacramento Valley council municipalities will receive approximately \$755,000 in gas tax funds in the fiscal year 1948-49, an increase of 150 per cent over the 1/2 cent allotment under previous laws. Sacramento valley counties, receiving apportionments under the new law—based upon car registration and county-maintained primary road mileage—will gain about \$3,193,873 in new funds for the 1948-49 fiscal year, making an estimated \$6,647,900 available next year for the nineteen counties. These include:

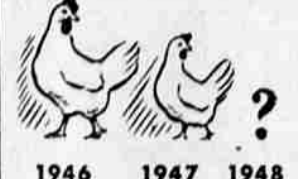
Realtors Talk Rent Laws

The housing and rent act of 1947 with changes in regard to construction priorities was discussed at the regular Wednesday meeting of the Klamath board of realtors, with Robert Chilcote presiding.

E. M. Chilcote, long-time Klamath realtor, outlined provisions of the bill and advised that both landlords and tenants familiarize themselves with the portion of the bill dealing with the 15 per cent rent increase. He pointed out that a written lease agreement between landlord and tenant must be drawn up before this increase can go into effect.

The meeting was attended by 12 local realtors.
