WEATHER

KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY: Partly cloudy today, tonight and Saturday. Few scattered showers this afternoon and tonight in mountains. High today 72, low 57. High Saturday 73.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA: Mostly clear today, tonight and Saturday, except afternoon and evening thunderstorms in extreme northern mountains. Little change in temperature. Gentle southwesterly winds north of Pelee and moderate northwesterly in southern portion.

OREGON: Considerable cloudiness with scattered light showers or thunderstorms today and tonight, slightly cooler today, Saturday partly cloudy west and fair east, except for few afternoon thunderstorms, slightly warmer Saturday, gentle southwest to east wind off coast.

Farley Reveals That FDR Hoped To Lose Election

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Mrs. Roosevelt and two of the Roosevelt sons, Elliott and Franklin Jr. He said Cordell Hull, then secretary of state, Jesse H. Jones, at that time chairman of the reconstruction finance corporation, or Paul McNutt, an avowed vice presidential candidate, could have been nominated.

Hull, he added, did not want it. Jones decided of his own accord to withdraw his name, and McNutt withdrew "at the president's request."

"Jim," Farley reported the president as saying, "I've told the family I want them to vote for me, but I also told them I wanted them to pray I would be defeated."

"That is the best thing that could happen to you," Farley said he replied seriously, "and I'm not certain it won't happen. If anyone considers this one a walkaway he is crazy."

(Roosevelt won 449 electoral votes to 82 for the late Wendell Willkie.) Farley titled his fifth article "The Parting of the Ways." He wrote that Roosevelt insisted on Henry A. Wallace as his running mate in 1940 despite protests from Farley.

Thunder Storm Roars Over Klamath Basin, But Does Little Damage To Forests

Thursday's thunderstorm passed over the forest areas of Klamath county causing little lightning fire damage.

One lightning-caused fire was reported by Harry Savage, fire lookout on Yainax butte at 6:43 p. m. Thursday, and an incendiary fire was reported in to Klamath Forest Protective association headquarters by Ivan Warren, Sycan butte lookout at 3:45 p. m.

The fire in the far side of Swan lake valley in the vicinity of Swan Lake Point lookout was the only lightning strike reported from the storm which was passing over this territory.

A fire crew from KPPA headquarters was in charge of control on this fire and although both lookouts in the vicinity reported no smoke seen from their vantage points Friday morning, the plane from the Indian reservation, flying over this morning reported the spot still smoking and the crew is on duty there today. No information had been received regarding extent of damage.

Warren reported smoke in the vicinity of Thompson reservoir in the Silver Lake area and a crew from Pole butte investigating, found a man wandering around in a dazed manner who, they reported, said he had lighted a fire to keep warm—and about half an acre was burned over when they arrived.

Information received at KPPA today gave the man's name as Pete Webster, but no details were available. He was taken first to Silver Lake, then to Paisley, where he was held until he was taken to Lakeview for a hearing at 9 o'clock Friday morning. Hal Ogle, KPPA superintendent and C. V. Williams, state logging inspector, attended the hearing.

U. S. forest service reports from lookouts today included rain on Brown mountain, overcast at Lookout butte, visibility poor at Pelican butte and no smoke seen anywhere

from Fort Klamath lookout station, although visibility this morning was fair.

Pea Pack Reaches One-Third Mark
LA GRANDE, July 11 (AP)—Pea pack at the new Elgin cannery passed the 70,000 case mark today, with the season one-third complete, according to M. B. Blamires, manager.

Peas have been of high grade, Blamires said, with 75 percent of the pack fancy grade. The balance has been medium grade.
