Mrs. Victor O'Neill, new board member of school district No. 1, and Nelson Reed, re-elected director on board No. 2, were sworn in to their respective positions at a joint meeting of the two school boards Monday night. Ed Robinson was elected chairman of the elementary board, and Reed, chairman of the Klamath Union high school board. A. W. Heston was chosen clerk for both boards, and Wilson Wiley is the new attorney for both districts.

The high school board will meet Thursday afternoon to study bids on building improvements which will include reconstruction of the front steps of the high school and a new approach to the cafeteria.

The boards, jointly, have purchased three buildings at the former naval air station for use in various building projects. Arnold L. Gralapp, superintendent of schools, said today that the structures, the former recreation hall, mess hall and a barracks building, will probably be dismantled with the materials to be used for school construction work.

Two resignations were accepted by board no. 1, including Joan Parsons, formerly a Mills teacher, who has accepted the supervision of vocal music in Lewiston, Ida., and Chester Squire, formerly of the Fairview staff, who has been named principal of an elementary school in Ashland.

New teachers added to the elementary staff are Mary Guillet, who holds her master of arts degree from Colorado State Teachers college, first grade assignment, and Maurice Anderson, a graduate of Peru State Teachers college in Nebraska, upper grade assignment.

The board also decided to purchase a trampoline and four gym mats as a start in a conditioning program.
