

Morse Accuses GOP Heads Of Attempt To Kill Bill To Up Vet's School Pay

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore.) today accused the senate GOP leadership of trying to kill off through delaying action a measure which would boost government payments to veterans studying under the GI bill.

"The leadership is playing politics with veterans legislation," Morse told a reporter after an unsuccessful attempt to get a vote on the proposal. "Their strategy is to pass this at the tail end of the session so the house won't have time to act."

Senator Taft (Ohio), chairman of the senate republican policy committee, denied any such intention. He said the bill will be considered in its turn, but that the senate first must push through a number of delayed appropriations for the fiscal year which began July 1.

"If every senator is going to insist that his bill be first," Taft said, "there can be no order."

Within Six Votes

With the gleeful support of all democrats present, Morse came within six votes late yesterday of upsetting the leadership's legislative schedule to take up the veteran's bill without delay.

Republican chieftains had to go

through the tedious process of adjourning the senate by a formal rollcall vote in order to retain control. The adjournment motion carried 25 to 23 with four republicans joining 23 democrats on the losing side.

Morse got the floor during a lull in discussion of a bill carrying funds for a score or more of government corporations.

He urged immediate passage of the bill which would hike monthly allowance to single veterans attending schools from \$90 to \$75; married veterans from \$90 to \$105; and married veterans with children from \$90 to \$120.

After a hurried floor conference between republican leaders Senator Brewster (R-Me.) moved to adjourn. Morse forced a rollcall.

Republicans joining him and a solid democratic line against the motion were Aiken of Vermont, and Cooper of Kentucky and Langer of North Dakota.

Morse said he would push two other veterans bills at the first opportunity. One would authorize purchases of automobiles or other conveniences for veterans who are blind or seriously disabled. The other would raise the present monthly pay ceilings for veterans receiving on-the-job training allowances from \$175 to \$200 for single veterans and \$200 to \$250 for married veterans.

Troop 33, from Sprague River and Troop 6 from Klamath Falls are at Camp Makualla now and will return home July 27.

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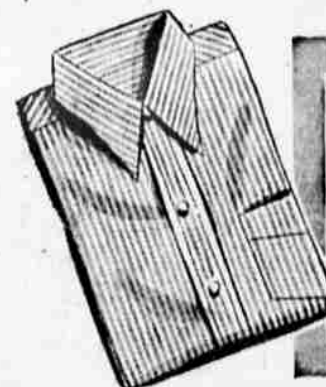
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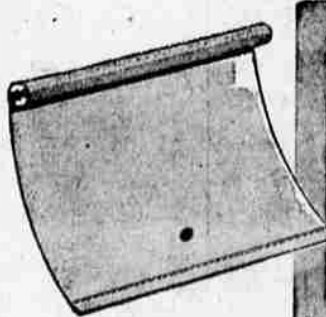
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
