So saying, Designer Rentner shows a highly wearable group of fall fashions which he calls "modern empire," in which he uses shoulder pads boldly, clings in many instances to the slim skirt, tapers waistlines and eschews hip pads. A high spot of his collection is the flowing "Dickens collar," upstanding in back, with long points in front, reappearing on coats and suits alike.
