Lake Road Work Done

Progress is being made on the construction of the Lower Klamath lake secondary highway, according to S. P. Jones, resident engineer with the Oregon state highway commission. At present indications are that the work will be finished by the deadline, October 31. The project concerns the secondary highway which stretches from Mac's store to Midland on which work was started July 2.

Contractor in charge is E. L. Somers of Klamath Falls. The bid let June 23 calls for a \$169,759 expenditure for 7.01 miles of grading, surfacing and oiling.

This highway connects U. S. highway No. 97, main artery between Klamath Falls and San Francisco, with state highway No. 39 which joins Klamath Falls and the South End area. This road will make it unnecessary for people in the southern section to enter Klamath Falls before turning south to Weed and Yreka.
