

# Yankees Tie Win Record

## Ex-Portlander Vic Raschi Hurls Second Victory Of Week As Streak Reaches 19

The New York Yankees' merciless victory march in the American league had even the rival National League clubs jittery today. With 19 straight victories under their belts to tie the American league consecutive win record, the Bronx Bombers are casting covetous glances at the only two winning streaks exceeding theirs—the 21 straight by the 1935 Chicago Cubs and the major league record of 26 polled by the New York Giants in 1916.

The Yankees made it 19 in a row yesterday when they defeated the Cleveland Indians in both ends of a double header 3-1 and 7-2 at Cleveland's municipal stadium. The double victory enabled them to equal the 41-year-old standard set by the Chicago White Sox in 1906.

Vic Raschi, a 29-year-old right-hander recalled recently from Portland of the Pacific Coast league, doled out six hits in the second game to gain his second victory in a week.

The double win enabled the Yanks to maintain their 11½ game lead over the second place Tigers. The Bengals came from behind twice to capture both ends of a double header from Washington 7-5 and 4-3.

The Red Sox remained a game behind the Tigers by winning two from the White Sox in Chicago 4-1 and 6-3, the second game going 11 innings.

The Philadelphia Athletics, leading 7-2 going into the ninth inning, whacked across nine more runs to trounce the Browns in a night game in St. Louis, 16-2.

Mel Queen, newest pitching member of the Pittsburgh Pirates, won over Clyde King and the Brooklyn Dodgers 7-1 at Ebbets field.

The fourth place St. Louis Cardinals moved within four and a half games of the National league leading Dodgers when they defeated the Braves in a night game in Boston 5-2.

Rain and wet grounds caused the postponement of the scheduled doubleheader between the Cubs and Giants at the Polo grounds, Cincinnati and the Philadelphia Phillies were not scheduled.

## Locke Plans Coast Tour

TORONTO, July 18 (AP)—Bobby Locke, the South African golfing star, said he plans to go to the Canadian and U. S. west coast the second week in September for a series of four or five exhibition matches.

Stan Leonard and Fred Wood, Vancouver pros playing in the Canadian Open here, will play with Locke and they may be joined either by Lew Worsham, United States Open champion, or Ellsworth Vines of Los Angeles, a former United States Davis Cup tennis player, also in the present tournament.

Leonard has been making arrangements for the series but said exact dates have not yet been set. The tour will probably take in Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle courses.

## Beavers Lose Two, Drop Into Seventh

Once you get past the first three teams, there's no telling who you'll meet in the clubby Coast league.

Today, for example, San Diego is fourth, Seattle fifth, Sacramento sixth, Portland seventh, Hollywood last. Yesterday it was Sacramento, Portland, San Diego, Seattle, Hollywood.

What it amounts to, virtually, is a five-team second division, with only Los Angeles, Oakland and San Francisco staying above 500.

The leading Angels pelted San Francisco last night, 10-2, to maintain a five-game margin over Oakland which humbled Hollywood, 4-2. Tommy Seals hurled his seventh straight win to pitch San Diego's Padres to a 7-4 triumph over Sacramento. The Padres, with 477, thus squeezed into fourth place over Seattle, which rose to 476 by again double-waxing Portland, 3-2 and 7-1.

San Diego's reviving Padres made it five in a row by blasting Tony Freitas out in a four-run sixth inning featured by Ray Tran's second triple of the game and a two-run homer by Dain Clay. Loop-pacing Maxie West rapped his 25th circuit win with one on in the fifth.

Pitching—which was supposed to be Portland's strong suit—gave Seattle another pair, their second double victory in two nights over the Beavers. Herman Rescoe's four-hitter edged Vince Di Biasi in the eight-inning opener, and Sic Jakucki was too tough in the pinches in the nightcap, allowing 12 hits but only one run.

A pinch single by Bob Johnson, former American leaguer, broke up the tight first game, in which Joe Reich of Portland and Manager Jolo White of the Rainiers homered.

The Beaver-Rainier marathon continues with another double shot tonight.

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## No Trick At All... Aquatic Sport Taught In Five Easy Lessons

Interest in swimming has been growing by dives and splashes in Klamath Falls with the advent of hot weather, and of primary importance in the swimming program being carried on by the recreation department are the lessons being given local small fry.

Many of these youngsters have hardly been in water, except for the Saturday night bath, and teaching them to swim is no small task.

Joe Peak, physical education director of the city schools, and Lilian Redkey, girls' physical ed instructor at KUBS, divide teaching duties in the six classes being carried on each day in the high school pool.

The first step in learning how to swim is to become sufficiently unafraid of the water to be able to relax, and until a pupil can relax, swimming is well-nigh impossible.

That's where something called the "jelly-fish" float comes in. The novice in the pool is told to put his head under the surface of the water and hold his breath. Most of them shut their eyes. The instructor then tries to get the pupil's feet off the bottom. After a while the student gets up enough courage to duck his head in the water, bend over and clasp his arms around his knees and relax. That's the "jelly-fish" float and there's nothing to it.

When the fear of water is overcome, the beginner is taught to float in a prone position, face down.

The "dog paddle," frowned on in elite swimming circles, is the next step, a maneuver regarded very highly by the local instructors in teaching a youngster to handle himself safely in the water. When the paddling is mastered, the student can stop right there and have a lot of fun, or go on to the finer points of the art of swimming.

The overhead stroke is taught next. It's just an extension of the basic dog paddle that brings into play both arm and leg motion and rhythmic breathing. When the student gets this far he's able to handle himself pretty well in the water and can easily pick up the crawl, breast stroke, back stroke and other fine points as he picks up his confidence in the pool.

While outlining these steps, the instructors pointed out that many parents do not understand why their children don't become proficient swimmers over a 10-weeks period of schooling. With as many as 40 to 50 pupils to a single class, and two or three sessions per week for each class, the teachers just aren't able to devote much time to individual instruction.

Individual instruction and lengthy practice is necessary for really rapid progress in aquatics.

The main aim of the local swimming program is to teach every child the basic principles of handling himself in the water, and then let experience do the rest.

One thing for sure, once a child learns how to swim, he'll know how the rest of his days.

## FISHING PROSPECT IS BETTER FOR WEEK-END

PORTLAND, July 18 (AP)—Prospects are improved for Oregon sports fishermen this week-end. The state game commission said sea-run bluebacks were entering Winchester bay and limit catches of mountain trout were reported in many areas.

The weekly report: PORTLAND AREA — Columbia county streams too low, but good sturgeon and spiny-rayed catches from Columbia river and sloughs. Hood River county rivers poor, muddy.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY — Limit catches from McKenzie and Willamette rivers in Lane county on flies and single eggs, from Marion lake and Clear lake in Linn county; moderately good fishing in McKenzie tributaries above Blue river; Benton county streams dropping rapidly, outlook poor.

DESCHUTES AREA — Fishing good on Paulina, South Twin, and North Twin lakes; fly fishing excellent in Upper Wickiup river.

COASTAL AREA — Clatsop county poor; Tillamook county good; Coos county generally poor for trout though some sea run trout taken from Coquille river, and streams yielding many bass and spiny-rayed; Curry county angling good, with several limits of salmon and steelhead trout from Rogue river; Lincoln county's small streams only fair but upper waters of Siletz, Salmon, Alsea and Yaquina rivers yielding trout on flies.

SOUTHERN OREGON — Lake of the Woods excellent for yellow perch, and rainbows beginning to strike; Rogue river good for trout; Fish lake and Four-Mile lake good; Lower Umpqua river good for sea-run bluebacks, silverside, salmon and Chinook salmon.

EASTERN OREGON — Umatilla county fishing improved, with several bag limits of trout taken from larger streams; dark field best lure; Union county fair. Wallowa county streams and lakes producing rainbows and brook trout on bait or fly.

ST. LOUIS, July 18 (AP)—The St. Louis Browns have become the third modern major league club to open the door to negro players, joining the Brooklyn Dodgers and Cleveland Indians by signing two men and purchasing an option on a third.

Infielder Henry Thompson and Outfielder Willard Brown joined Herold (Muddy) Ruel's club last night with Thompson seeing action at second base against the Philadelphia Athletics—but he went hitless in four batting trips and chalked up an error on a grounder.

Both players came to St. Louis from the Kansas City Monarchs in the negro American Baseball league where Thompson was hitting .347 and Brown .333. Owner Richard Muckerman of the Browns said the two players were signed "to help lift the Browns out of the American league cellar."
