

Truman Signs Succession Act

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Truman today signed the presidential succession bill placing speaker Joseph Martin (R-Mass.) in line to replace him in the event Mr. Truman is unable to complete his term.

The legislation, which Mr. Truman requested immediately after he entered the White House and became the vice presidency, was signed as part of the presidential outline.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross, who told reporters of the signing, said he knows of no plans to resign a secret service agent to protect Martin.

Secret service agents also said they know of no such intention.

Until Mr. Truman signed the legislation, Secretary of State Marshall had been next in line to the presidency.

The new bill outlining the order of presidential succession places the speaker immediately behind the vice president.

The president's temporary of the senate—now Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.)—is next in line of succession after the speaker of the house.

Cabinet officers, starting with the secretary of state, follow in order provided by previous law.

Road Work Nears End

TULELAKE, July 18—Grading is almost completed and surfacing will get under way within the next few days on the new cut-off between Dorris and Tulelake. The highway extends from U. S. highway No. 97 east to the vicinity of Tulelake.

Fairey-Hammond and Parish, Inc., of San Francisco have established headquarters at the Farmers sand and gravel pit west of Merrill and are preparing to surface the 16 miles of new road. All materials will be processed at the plant and hauled hot in metal dump-bed trucks to the road.

A contract has also been signed by the company to re-surface seven miles of the old road stretching south from Hatfield toward Alturas.

Work on the two projects should be completed in about three months.

Wheat Yield May Show Slight Loss

PORTLAND, July 18 (AP)—The Oregon wheat basin country expected slightly reduced yields today because of wind and hail storms this week.

A survey indicated the state's expected 24,400,000 bushel crop might be cut about 900,000 bushels.

The federal crop insurance corporation received claims here for 18,000 acres of wheat in Morrow county damaged by hail. The Gilliam county agent said 5000 acres were damaged there and Sherman county reported 1000 acres damaged.

Navy Fund Gets Okay

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—President Truman today signed the bill giving the navy \$3,433,046,100 for operations in the fiscal year that started July 1.

The bill provides for a projected program supporting an average navy strength of 395,000 enlisted men and 42,000 officers.

It is approximately \$244,000,000 below the president's budget estimates.

The new appropriation includes transfers of \$164,280,000 from other navy funds which could not be used for general purposes. In addition, it authorizes contract authority up to \$248,000,000 for the purchase of aircraft.

New Designs Dash Hopes Of Making Clothes Last

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—The cape back suit and the peg-top drape are Samuel Kasa's contribution to the current throw-out-all-year-old clothes movement.

Though he retains wide shoulders, Kasa has enough other new tricks up his sleeve to make last year's costumes strictly passe. Just to make things difficult for the man who thinks that old cardigan suit still looks fine on his wife, Kasa shows a series of strictly new silhouettes, typical of which is a suit of amethyst wool with velvet collar and hip length cape attached to the shoulders of the jacket. The skirt, of course, is much longer than those of last year, and has just enough subtle flare to make it fall, 1947.

Kasa also shows dinner suits, such as one in dark green wool, with pleated skirt and short jacket over a beaded chiffon top.

Jo Copeland, designer famous for suave cocktail suits and dramatic evening gowns, makes 1947 history with her black faille bustle suit, featuring a huge, jutting bow in back, a short fitted jacket and velvet trim.

Cain Recall Move Held Illegal

OLYMPIA, July 18 (AP)—Secretary of State Belle Reeves yesterday rejected a petition to recall Sen. Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.), when advised by Atty. Gen. Smith Troy that "we find no authority under either federal or state laws for the recall of a United States senator."

The petition, signed by 251 persons and filed by William H. Jones of Clark county, accused Cain of "malfeasance or misfeasance" in office because he voted for the Taft-Hartley labor bill and co-sponsored the Cain-Russell housing disposal measure.
