Lace And Fluff Rule Fashion In Omar Kiam's New York Show

She bears no resemblance to the neat, streamlined American woman of the last few years, who took pride in under-dressing rather than over-dressing, who swore by the tailored suit as a workaday uniform and kept her evening gowns, if any, as simple as her house dresses.

The lid is off this year, and designers are making the most of their new freedom, reveling in the return of ten-yard skirts and imported laces and silks.

One of the ringleaders in the revival of the era of elegance is Omar Kiam, of the house of Ben Reig, who shows a collection so opulent that it leaves his current audience, composed of fashion editors of newspapers throughout the country, gasping and rubbing their eyes.

There is no hint of the simple little basic dress which served so well during the wartime years in Kiam's collection for fall, 1947. His theory is that it's time for women to dress up again, and he provides the inducements, with elaborate evening gowns of satin and beaded lace, dramatic evening cloaks with flowing cape backs, fabulous gowns of gold and silver lace, cocktail frocks with completely circular accented pleated skirts.

Mr. Kiam achieves a completely new look by the use of shouldered, that are rounded but still padded, varies the silhouette from wide, pleated skirts to pencil slim lines with superimposed side drapery. His cocktail and afternoon costumes are almost all ankle length, his formal gowns floor length.
