Church Denies Commy Charge

QUEBEC, July 21 (AP)—Charles F. Taft, president of the Federal Council of Churches in America, in a telephone interview yesterday said a charge that the council was "near communism" was "not worth dignifying by an answer."

Vacationing at his summer home at Pointe-au-Pic, about 70 miles northeast of here, Taft commented on a statement made by the 10th general synod of the Bible Presbyterian Churches of America.

Taft said "this is a set of charges made by a very small and extremely fundamentalist group which are not worth dignifying by an answer."

In convention at Tacoma, Wash., Friday the synod blasted the council as "the voice of modernism" and representing "radical pacifism in America." It also denounced the council for using "unbiblical phrases."

Chinese Said Using American Weapons

MOSCOW, July 21 (AP)—Izvestia quoted radio reports from communist-controlled areas in China today as saying enough American weapons had fallen into their hands from captured Chinese nationalist troops "to equip 10 divisions."

The Soviet government newspaper quoted these reports in reply to the recent statement of a Chinese government commander in Manchuria who said the communists were receiving arms from Russians and Northern Koreans.

"The hypocritical complaints of defeated kuomintang generals" obviously are directed to the wrong address," the editorial said.
