Air Force Day Observance Set

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100 Planes Expected At Lake Show

LAKEVIEW, Ore., July 23—Over 100 visiting planes are expected to attend the Southern Oregon Air Carnival being held here on July 26 and 27. Art Seymour, president of the Lake County Aeronautics association, announced.

The Air Carnival, sponsored by the L.C.A.A., will feature the Journal helicopter, piloted by aerial photographer Joe Stein of Portland, parachute jumps by the Bower brothers of Yreka, California and Dean Brady of Lakeview, and aerobatics in a PT-17 by B. Lanslett of Bunsenville.

The program for the two-day event will be as follows:
Saturday, July 26: Model airplane demonstrations of local planes; Eagle's banquet for flying guests; and a hangar balloon dance.
Sunday, July 27: Mayor's breakfast for flying guests, sponsored by the Lakeview service clubs; air races for 65 horsepower, 100 horsepower and under, and all-class planes; parachute jumps; demonstrations of commercial airplanes; demonstration of Oregon Journal helicopter; flour bombing and paper cutting contests; aerobatics; and controlled and free-flight model airplane contests.

Veck Will Lose More Of Limb

CLEVELAND, July 23 (AP)—Surgeons expect to remove about two additional inches from Bill Veck's right leg today because the stump from his first amputation has failed to heal properly.

The Cleveland Indians president was in Cleveland clinic hospital for the operation. His leg was hurt in a wartime accident.
"I've got no one but myself to blame for this," said Veck. "When I get out of here this time I'll be a good boy."

Ray Sawyer, AMVET national commander, said the action makes AMVETS the first World War 88 veterans organization to be recognized officially by congress.
