KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY—Partly cloudy today and Friday, with scattered showers tonight. High today 67, low 55. High Friday 66.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA—Clear today, tonight and Friday, except few light showers in extreme northern mountains. Slowly rising daytime temperatures in interior. Moderate to fresh northwesterly wind off coast.

Recovery Of Cash Sought

The state industrial accident commission has filed two law suits with the circuit clerk here seeking restoration of money paid out of the industrial accident fund to two persons hurt at work here.

The first suit is against James A. Loe, logging contractor, for \$440.35 paid to Aaa Howell, employed by Loe and injured March 26, 1946. The other is for \$46.25 against the Superior Troy laundry.

An employee of the laundry, DeLore Looetee, received burns on both hands while at work July 22, 1944.

In both suits the commission says the defendants did not file notice of engaging in hazardous work and did not file notice of electing not to contribute to the state industrial accident fund.
