British Ship Sinks At Haifa
JERUSALEM, July 24 (AP)—Official sources reported today that the British ship Empire Lifeguard had been sunk in Haifa harbor, presumably by saboteurs, shortly after disembarking 261 legal Jewish immigrants transported to the Holy Land from detention camps on Cyprus.
A British release disclosing the sinking said:
"The Empire Lifeguard, a transport returning Jewish immigrants from Cyprus, was sunk this morning in Haifa harbor by an internal explosion after all the immigrants had disembarked."
"It is believed that a charge was placed on board while the ship was taking on the immigrants at Fumagusta (a port in Cyprus)."

Teacher Supply Situation Better
The teacher supply problem in the county school system is somewhat improved over last year, Harold Ashley, county school superintendent, said today. Most major positions have been filled, with the exception of a principal to head the Merrill schools.
Ashley is working to secure a principal to head the post at Merrill left vacant by George Elliott, who succeeds Carol Howe, former principal of the Henley schools. Howe has accepted a position as a high school supervisor with the state department of education.
