

Alaskans Hunt Double Slayer

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 24 (AP)—U. S. Marshal Stanley J. Nichols, heading what is described as the largest manhunt in Alaska's modern history expressed doubt today that the fugitive double ax-slayer will be taken alive.

Nichols said escape from the rough terrain of the mosquito-plagued region is virtually impossible and expressed belief the hunted man, Leon Jones, 43-year-old carpenter at the Big Delta construction work, might take his own life before being taken.

Jones is sought on warrants charging him with the slaying of two men following a heavy drinking party at an Indian encampment some 150 miles southeast of Fairbanks. The slain men were Donald R. Harris, 33, also a Big Delta construction worker, and Carl Ahnstrom, 68, long-time Alaska trapper and prospector.

Marines Get Medal Offer

Headquarters, marine corps, Washington, D. C., has announced today that any person who served in the Marine Corps between September 8, 1939, and December 31, 1946, and was discharged honorably or under honorable conditions, is eligible to receive the American defense service medal and/or the World War II victory medal.

Eligible for the American defense service medal are those who served with the marine corps between September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941, both dates inclusive. All persons who served in the marine corps between December 7, 1941, and December 31, 1946, are eligible to receive the World War II victory medal.

Former marine desiring to make application for these medals may do so by applying in person or writing to the marine corps recruiting office, room 268, new U. S. court house, S. W. Broadway and Main, Portland 5, Ore., on or after August 1, 1947. Copy of discharge certificate must be presented when personal application is made. Original or copy thereof must accompany each written application.

Indians Fight McNary Dam

LAPWAI, Idaho, July 24 (AP)—Al-Redy authorized by Nez Perce Indian tribesmen to seek an injunction halting construction of McNary dam, tribal Attorney Kenneth R. L. Simmons of Billings, Mont., will meet Friday at Toppensh to consider similar action by the Yakimas.

The Nez Perce allege McNary dam construction at Umatilla, Ore., violates an 1855 treaty entered into by themselves and the Yakimas with the federal government.

Simmons said congressional authorization does not provide for condemnation or compensation for Indian property affected by the dam. The construction also "jeopardizes" Nez Perce fishing rights which department of interior estimates have valued at between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000, he said.

Carl Arnold of Buckeye, Ariz., whose roping feuds with Bob Crosby of Roswell, N. M., have been famous in the Southwest, clinched first go-round money in the steer roping with 22.3, made Tuesday.

First go-round bulldogging honors went to Dub Phillips of San Angelo, Texas, who twisted down his steer in the fast time of 12.4 seconds despite a muddy arena.
