1942 Attack Described In Records Of Fort Stevens

ASTORIA, Ore., July 24 (AP)—An army account of enemy agents signaling from shore while Japanese submarines shelled the beaches near Fort Stevens the night of June 21-22, 1942, was told today.

The attack on the fort at the mouth of the Columbia river—the first on a U. S. continental base in the 130 years since the war of 1812—was described briefly in records of the 95-year-old fort now being abandoned by the army.

Capt. Kenneth Hawkes, in charge of dismantling the fort guns, said records kept by Col. C. S. Doney, then commanding the fort, noted that the enemy fire was not returned because of shortage of ammunition and guns. Ten five-inch shells struck the beach but there was no damage and no injuries to personnel of the establishment. Col. Doney praised the men under his command for their work that night.

He noted that "friendly sympathizers were seen by the army signaling from the beach." The statement was not elaborated on, but at the time Japanese aliens had been interned on the west coast.

Swan Island Up For Lease

PORTLAND, July 24 (AP)—Swan Island shipyard will be put up for lease during the four years remaining under the government control of the war-built property the war assets administration reported today.

The WAA said the decision came after the port of Portland declined to purchase the facilities. The port had earlier made an offer, which was rejected, and when the Kaiser interests dropped an option on the yard, the port group withdrew from the negotiations.

The WAA said the yard would be divided into units and the Kaiser company will be offered a lease to continue its ship repair operation.

US Making Atom Bombs

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—The United States is still making atomic bombs, and looking for ways to make better ones, the atomic energy commission reported to congress today.

The commission further said that if this country is to hold its leadership in atomic energy development many more scientists and industries must be drawn into the program.

In its second semi-annual statement the commission said it "has pressed the production of fissionable materials and the improvement of atomic weapons as essential to the security of the country."

The report added that the commission "is pushing research for wider application of atomic energy and its by-products" to peacetime uses.

The report, signed by all the commission's members, said the commission's objective is to develop atomic energy while assuring "the common defense and security."

Church Ups School Cash

CHICAGO, July 24 (AP)—The Centennial convention of the Evangelical Lutheran synod of Missouri, Ohio and other states today granted a total of \$1,494,992 for new construction at 12 Lutheran schools and also raised the salaries of teachers at church schools.

The delegates voted to increase wages of tutors, instructors and assistant professors 15 per cent beginning with the new fiscal year starting Feb. 1, 1948. Professors and presidents of Lutheran schools were increased 30 per cent.

The delegates agreed to grants for construction projects including: Concordia college, Portland, Ore., \$110,000 for administration and library facilities and a chapel.
