TOKYO, July 24 (AP)—Gen. H. D. G. Crerar, Canada's senior soldier, will arrive in Japan August 2 to visit top occupation officers and obtain first-hand information on the occupation.

The Canadian liaison mission said Crerar will visit General MacArthur and Gen. H. C. H. Robertson, commander of British commonwealth occupation forces. He will be accompanied by Brig. Sherwood W. Lett, Air Commodore C. B. Godwin, Col. F. L. T. Clifford, Roland Bock and Ralph Collins.

The party, flying here in a Canadian airforce plane, will spend one week in Tokyo and one in the BCOF area in Southwestern Honshu.
