

Pros Blamed For Holdup At Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26 (AP)—Police today blamed a sick, professional ring of holdup men for the \$27,563 robbery of the Lipman Wolfe and company department store—a robbery carried out so smoothly that not one of hundreds of shoppers guessed what was going on.

Police said they believed it was planned by the same gang that robbed the Olds & King department store of \$117,000 in checks and \$304 in cash June 2.

The loot in yesterday's robbery was \$36,000 in checks and \$11,563 in cash.

Three calm, well-dressed men stepped into an empty elevator at the store and at gunpoint ordered Phyllis Smith, 24, elevator operator, to take them to the ninth floor.

There two ordered Cashier Otto Koencke to lie on the floor and scooped up cash and a money bag deposit. The third covered Miss Smith.

They had her take them to the basement, then directed her to "go back to the 9th floor and keep quiet." She said she saw them separate and walk unburied toward different basement exits. The men held handkerchiefs over their faces, but Miss Smith gave partial descriptions to police.

After the grange meeting last Saturday evening the members were treated to a big watermelon feed. A social hour of dancing was enjoyed just preceding the refreshments.

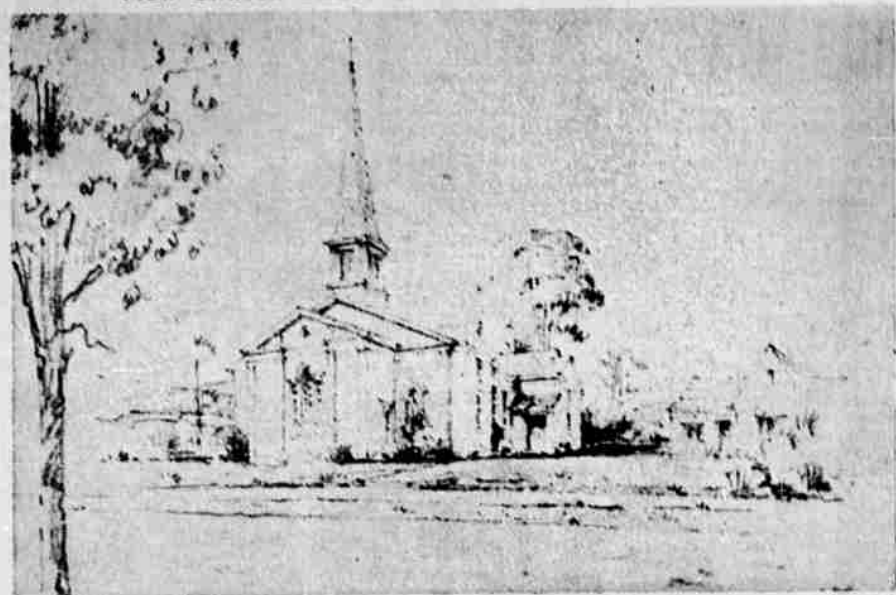

New Church Under Construction On South Sixth

Peace Memorial Church To Have Cornerstone Laying At Lakeview

The cornerstone of the Peace Memorial Presbyterian church will be laid in a ceremony to take place at the site of the new structure on S. 6th street Sunday, July 27 at 3 p. m.

Members of the new church and friends will gather at that time to participate in the traditional ceremony. In charge of the program will be Dr. L. O. Walter, executive of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon. Alvin C. Olson, elder of the church and principal of the Altamont Junior high school, will represent the congregation in the actual laying and setting of the stone.

There will be sacred music before the program, and Carl Hagel, baritone, will sing two solos. A history of the church from its organization to the present will be presented by Maj. Arthur Dixon.

Work on the new church was started less than three weeks ago, and plans call for the completion of the structure around the last of September. Much of the material to be used in construction was purchased from the war assets administration. An army chapel from Camp White, near Medford, was obtained and transported here in sections. However, design changes and additions to the basic structure have been incorporated which rule out any close resemblance to the standard army chapel.

One of the unique features of the Sunday ceremony will be the placing of the cornerstone of the names of all those attending the gathering in addition to the usual historical data. The cornerstone is to be of Rock of Ages marble and bears the inscription "Peace Memorial Presbyterian Church, 1947." The public has been cordially invited to take part in the event.

Rev. David Barnett Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will give the invocation. Greetings to the congregation of the church will be extended by Ray Garrison, president of the South Sixth Street Improvement association; Rev. Keith P. Fields of the Bible Baptist church; Fred Fleet of the First Presbyterian church; and Rev. Hugh Bronson, stated clerk of the Presbytery of Southwest Oregon and former pastor of Peace Memorial church. The ceremony will be closed by Rev. Hugh T. Mitchell, more present pastor of the new church.
