Quickie Travelogue Offers Sweeping View Of Heart Of Basin

For this week's travelogue, we have selected a 20-minute drive that affords a sweeping view of the heart of the Klamath basin. It is the Moore park loop — out through Moore park, and back to the city center by way of the ridge on the west side of Link river and down by Riverside school.

Our speedometer checked a distance of just 3.4 miles for this trip, starting at Oregon avenue and Upham, and ending at Main street and Cougar avenue.

Points of interest on the route include the Fremont bridge, Moore park itself, the vintage point west of the river, and Riverside school, one of the old landmarks of Klamath Falls.

The real attraction of the trip is this view.

From the hill above the river, one can look down on the mouth of the stream itself, and on out over Lake Ewauna, past the suburbs and the nearby farms, to the distant mountains.

Etched on the surface of Ewauna are the roundish masses of logs awaiting the haul into the mill, while the mills on the lake's shores, surrounded by piles of lumber, offer a picture of busy industry. Altogether, it is a striking and interesting view.

The travel surface on this loop is not all good. The road from the point it leaves Moore park to the Riverside school is unpaved and rough.

But it is short, any car can make it without trouble, and it's worth 20 minutes of anybody's time.

The speedometer log:
0.0 miles—Oregon and Upham
1.3 miles—Fremont bridge.
1.7 miles—Enter Moore park.
2.2 miles—Leave Moore park.
2.8 miles—River where picture was taken.
3.1 miles—Riverside school.
3.4 miles—Main and Conger.

ASTORIA, Ore., July 26 (AP)—The navy's operations here were consolidated today at Tongue Point, following abandonment of the Port of Astoria.

The port had been used in the war for aircraft carriers and attack transports. Port commissioners said they would negotiate with the navy on six month's rent, which they said the navy owed.

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Social Security Pay Lost Through Procedure Neglect

Some federal residents are losing out on federal old-age and survivors insurance because they neglected to communicate with or call at the office. Weidenheimer, acting manager of the Klamath Falls office of the social security administration, disclosed today. They are losing cash payments solely through neglect of the simple procedures necessary to secure them.

One elderly wage earner lost monthly payments throughout the past year because he relied upon unofficial advice. A widow with small children lost benefits for many months because she did not know it was necessary for her to file a formal application.

"The social security administration is offering its full cooperation to workers who have reached 65, and to the survivors of workers who die at any age," Weidenheimer said. "My office is using every means in its power to keep people fully informed about social security matters."

Weidenheimer pointed out that every wage earner age 65 or over, who has worked under social security, should secure information as to his status from an office of the social security administration whether or not he expects to retire soon. "Similarly," Weidenheimer said, "if the survivors of a wage earner who dies,

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Portal Type Suit Won By Lumber Firm

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26 (AP)—Federal Judge Michael J. Roche today dismissed a wage suit against a Eureka, Calif., lumber company—an action which an attorney said would mean savings of millions of dollars to the lumber industry.

The suit, brought by the wage and hour division of the U. S. department of labor against the Dolbeer and Carson Lumber company of Eureka, was dismissed at the request of the labor department. No reason for the request was given.

The labor department since 1945

has been seeking pay for loggers for the time they spent in walking to their places of work in the woods. The lumber companies have resisted this policy and have been paying only for whistle-to-whistle in the woods.

J. F. Cookley, attorney for the Dolbeer and Carson company, said today's court action would save the lumber industry millions of dollars in wages. He said dismissal of the suit resulted from the recent action of congress in outlawing portal-to-portal suits.

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
