Stocks Show Wide Break

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—The stock market today suffered one of its widest breaks in several months as late heavy selling knocked over leaders 1 to 3 or more points and put the high speed ticker tape behind for the first time since the tumble of last May 16.

Little in the way of bullish material was seen in the news and the list resumed Monday's retreat at the start.

Dealings tapered off subsequently. Approaching the final hour a flood of offerings hit the exchange with motors, steel, rails and numerous industrials under pressure.

On the losing side were Santa Fe, Union Pacific, Southern Railway, Pennsylvania Railroad, Northern Pacific, Southern Railway, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic Steel, Crucible Steel, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, Chrysler (at a 1947 low), Studebaker, Goodrich, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Douglas Aircraft, Caterpillar Tractor, Western Union "A", Kennecott, Anaconda, American Smelting, Du Pont, American Can, Union Carbide, U. S. Gypsum, Texas Co., Standard Oil (N.J.), Pacific Western Oil, United Fruit, American Woolen, Schenley and St. Regis Paper.

Bonds dipped with stocks. Cotton, toward the finish, was off \$2 to \$4 a bale. At Chicago wheat ended down 9 to 9 1/2 cents a bushel, corn 3 1/4 to 4 1/4 and oats 3 1/4 to 4.

Wheat Price Bottom Drops

CHICAGO, July 29 (AP)—Wheat led other grains downward on the board of trade today. The decline started at the opening on overnight announcement of smaller government export allocations for September, and lower government buying prices.

The selling was general in all pits. At the finish wheat was 9 cents to 9 1/2 cents lower than the previous close, September \$2.22-2.23 1/2.

At the low point of the morning session representatives of cash houses were good buyers, but the rally was good for only partial recovery, corn showing the greatest strength.
