

Dodgers Set Speedy Pace

Vic Raschi Bests Newhouser As Yanks Stretch League Lead To Ten Full Games

Joe Hatten, the stylish southpaw of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who has beaten Chicago six times without a setback this season, needs only three more triumphs over the Cubs to tie the record for most victories over a club in one year.

The record of nine is held by Ed Reulbach of the 1908 Cubs whose victims, strangely enough, were the Dodgers.

Hatten pitched a three-hit 4-0 shutout over his "cousins" yesterday to extend the Dodgers' winning streak to 10 straight, not counting the protested 3-2 "victory" over the St. Louis Cardinals July 20. It is the longest winning streak of the season in the National League.

The win enabled the Dodgers to maintain their seven game lead over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals who staged one of their customary fast finishes to nip the Boston Braves 8-7. Earl Torgerson homered for the Braves. The Braves dropped to nine games behind the Dodgers and one percentage point behind the third place New York Giants who lost to Cincinnati, 5-0.

Ghosts Here For All-Star Tilt Tonight

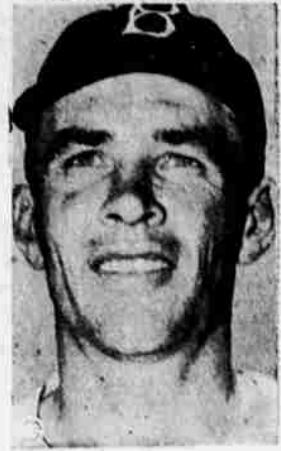

TED LONGWORTH ALONE IN SEATTLE GOLF LEAD

SEATTLE, July 29 (AP)—Ted Longworth of Portland stood alone atop the field today as the Washington state open golf tournament went into its final 18-hole round.

The Rose City professional, one of four tied for the lead at the end of the initial day's play, put a two-under-par 71 with his first day's 69 for 140, one stroke less than posted by defending champion Emery Zimmerman, also of Portland. Jim Christie of Seattle was third at 142. Two Seattleites, J. Wood and S. Allen, paced the amateurs at the two-thirds mark. Wood carries a seven-handicap and Allen a six. Spike Beeber Rated High In Jaycee Meet

Teen-Age Tourney Starting Today At Peoria Links

Golfdom's top teen-age shot-makers, 89 of them representing 26 states, were teeing off today at Mt. Hawley's country club in Peoria, Ill., in a 36-hole qualifying scrap which launches the second annual national junior chamber of commerce tournament.

Among the first to complete the qualifying rounds will be Spike Beeber of Klamath Falls, who took second place in the tourney last year. Spike was sent back to Peoria by the local Jaycees.

Last summer at Spokane Beeber was runnerup to Al Mengert of Spokane when the rounds were played over Mengert's home greensward at Spokane. Spike is a student at Washington State and is now making his home here.

The eyes of the gallery will be on Mengert and Beeber, but a favorite can't be named this early. Today's rounds over the 6428-yard layout will whittle the field of 89 down to 64 qualifiers for the tourney proper, match play, starting tomorrow.

Two 18-hole rounds a day Wednesday and Thursday will trim the starting field down to four for the 36-hole semi-finals Friday and the winners will clash over 36 holes Saturday for the championship.

Game Commission Might Have Added Time To Deer Season

According to one of our secret operatives, the state game commission was almost persuaded to give Oregon hunters a few extra days of deer season this fall, four or five, but persons who have a firm clutch on the collective ear of the commission put the odds to the idea. So deer season this fall will start on Wednesday, October 1, and run through Monday, October 20.

The game commission was under considerable pressure from hunters to extend the season a little and might have declared it open September 27, adding four more days to the front end. But a representative of the forest service, so our information goes, wouldn't stand still for that at all.

The forests are too dry, the argument went, in September and the forestry service wasn't going to allow any shooting before the first of October. They'd close the woods first.

So the commission, still casting about for the right time, considered tacking on an extra five days at the end of the season, having the closing date come on October 25. But the commission's chief biologist, we're told, wouldn't stay hitched for that. His argument was that the bucks are in rut after October 20.

Therefore, with the pressure being exerted on both ends, the commission declared a 20-day season and let it go at that.

It seems that the Chicago gals had gained control of the Chicago Women's Bowling association and were going to secede from the International, no less.

The judge ordered the girls to dig up all the dues they had collected that rightfully belonged to the WIBC and turn the money over to the court by the first of September, and that all records belonging to either the association or the International be turned over to the court.

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MAURIELLO IS 6 1/2-TO-5 BET OVER LESNEVICH

NEW YORK, July 29 (NEA)—Nothing exciting in the way of legalized assault and battery has happened in Brooklyn in some years, but leather will fly when Tami Mauriello and Gus Lesnevich renew their light-heavyweight feud of several years ago in a 10 rounder at Ebbets field Wednesday night.

They fought for the diadem twice in three months and Lesnevich grabbed the duke on both occasions, but the first was so close it called for the return.

Mauriello now comes in as a full-fledged 200 pound heavyweight and Joe Louis will attest that he can hit. Lesnevich weighed 178½ in his last outing when Melio Bettina stood in a stupor and let the Cliffside Park, N. J., veteran bat him into left field in 50 seconds, a new record for the coup.

Mauriello is the betting favorite, 6½ to 5.
