AUSTRALIA today directed her representative in the United Nations security council to draw the council's attention to the Indonesian situation as it is affected by Article 39 of the U.N. charter. Article 39 provides that upon having its attention called to it the security council "shall determine the existence of any threat to the peace, breach of peace or act of aggression, and shall make recommendations or decide upon measures which shall be taken... to maintain or restore international peace and security."

AS nearly as we can judge from censored dispatches (which, we are warranted in believing, are tinged with propaganda) there is shooting war in Northern Greece. There is certainly a clear threat to peace.

The United States has just proposed that United Nations TAKE ACTION TO SETTLE THE DISPUTE. Russia has just VETOED THE PROPOSAL.

WHEN the structure of United Nations was carpentered together in an atmosphere of hope strongly colored with faith, we knew what we wanted done in such situations.

WHAT happened? What slipped? Well, this is the story in a nutshell: Russia came into the charter convention at San Francisco with her fingers crossed. At the moment, she didn't want to say bluntly: "I'll have none of this one-world tommyrot. We have plans of our own."

So Russia temporized. She hatched up a scheme. The scheme was the VETO.

AS schemes go, it was a good one. IT HAS WORKED.
