

# Bright Jewelry Is Fashion For Fall

 CHICAGO (AP)—The well-jeweled woman of the coming season will look like a lady—with capital letters. Daintiness, even quaintness, will be emphasized in her jewelry, but the emphasis won't be subtle. Opulence is the keynote and it complements the fall fashion in its femininity.

At a fashion show Monday night sponsored by the jewelry industry council in connection with the convention of the National Association of Credit Jewelers, the attention-getting creations were big, bright, and brilliant.

But they had the air of the gentle-woman about them, whether they were 85 carat brooches or that of the career girl, tailored costume jewelry sets.

The "antique look" will be important this season and—from the fashion expert's comments—it would seem preferably that milady's jewels be brand new pieces made to look like antiques rather than the real article.

Enameled jewelry, to demurely suggest the baubles of grandmother's time, is extremely fashionable, as are ropes of pearls, pearls in choker fashion, or several strands of pearls treated as bibs. Colored beads and jade have their enthusiasts as do semi-precious stones.

Top item of the fashion show was a pair of blue-white pear-shaped diamond clips weighing 75 carats and valued at \$750,000.

Other jewelry ensembles included a diamond bib necklace, spray earrings and a square cut emerald ring worn with black moire dinner dress; 35 carat emerald and diamond bracelet and emerald and diamond clip and a 13 1/2 carat emerald ring; an 88 carat canary diamond clip and diamond earrings, and an antique diamond flower spray once presented by Napoleon to the Empress Josephine.

HARRISONBURG, Va., July 30 (AP)—At least six persons were killed and more than a score, mostly women, injured when an explosion in the basement of a beauty shop destroyed the shop and damaged nearby stores in the center of this Shenandoah valley town Tuesday.

Twenty-two injured persons were admitted to Rockingham county Memorial hospital.

Fire Chief Louis Armentrout said indications were that a boiler exploded in the basement of Pauline's beauty shop, located on Main street, across from the Harrisonburg Methodist church.

Armentrout said the explosion blew off the roof of the beauty shop and wrecked the adjacent Rhodes jewelry store.
