

Four Teachers Secured For School Posts Here

Four additional teachers have been secured for the staff of the city elementary and junior high schools. The two school boards, meeting Monday night, approved Buel Ward, Mrs. Carolyn Ward, James Young, and Myron Wheeler for teaching positions.

Ward, a graduate of Eastern Oregon college at Monmouth, did post graduate work at the University of Oregon, and was formerly a teacher in Tillamook county. He has been assigned to a junior high post.

Mrs. Ward, also a graduate of Monmouth, was assigned to an intermediate grade. Young will teach an upper grade class and boys' physical education. He was graduated from Maryville State Teachers' college, Missouri, doing additional work at Oregon State.

Wheeler will work in an inter-

mediate and instrumental music assignment. He is a graduate of Eastern Oregon College of Education, studying further at the University of Oregon.

Neva Dallas, who was named to an assignment last month, advised that she could not accept the position since she has been named to a supervisory position with the state.

School board No. 2 Klamath Union high school, had no resignations and no new assignments.

Supt. of City Schools Arnold L. Gralapp reported completion of the purchase of a mess hall, recreation hall and barracks at the former naval air station. Plans are being drawn for transferring the buildings and materials to school sites in the city.

C. H. Henderson, county agent, was present to advise members on the Smith-Hughes agriculture set-up. The board decided against instituting the program this year since it is necessary for a great deal of ground work to be ready before it can be started. Members decided to try to get the project under way for next year.

Wilson Wiley, school board attorney, was asked to investigate the legal technicalities of student traffic patrol to determine whether it would be advisable here.

The club's average daily gain per calf was 2.26 pounds for the July 26 weighing.

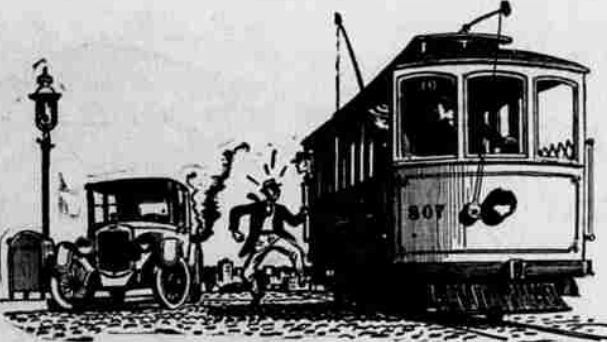
Tree Cutting Bids Slated

Bids for Christmas tree cutting in the Rogue River National Forest will be opened Friday, August 22, in the Medford office of Karl J. Jantich, forest supervisor.

The estimated 40,000 Shasta red fir or silver tips to be cut over several areas that have been divided into blocks for convenient bidding, and any or all of the four blocks may be applied for by a single bidder. Each block bid must be accompanied by \$500.

There are approximately 10,000 trees to be cut on each block. Block 1 is on Cat hill, out of Butte Falls; block 2, Rustler peak in the Frey creek area; block 3, Huckleberry mountain area out of Union creek; block 4, the Scott creek area east of Grater Lake National park.
