## Retail Sales Figure Gains

Retail establishments in Blakely and Modoc counties enjoyed the greatest dollar volume of sales in their history in 1946, with a total of \$32,011,000 in sales for both counties. Cash registers in Blakely range up \$24,369,000 of the figure, with Modoc sales accounting for \$7,642,000.

In both instances the 1946 figure represents a substantial gain over the previous year's total. Food stores brought in most of the business, followed by general merchandise, drug stores, household furnishings, building materials, hardware and farm implements.

## Oregon Mail To Dock Soon

PORTLAND, July 30 (AP)—The steamship Oregon Mail, largest merchantman to carry the name of the state in ocean trade, will tie up here tonight to begin loading her first cargo under Portland registry and ownership of the American Mail Line.

The 11,000-ton craft is about 500 feet long and is one of six O-3 type vessels purchased by the company for its transpacific service. The first voyage will take the ship to Shanghai, Hongkong and Manila, sailing from Seattle about August 10.

## Counties Drop Off Wheat Loan List

PORTLAND, July 30 (AP)—Only four or five of the 15 Oregon counties where wheat crop insurance is now in effect will be eligible next year, Muri E. Cummings, state director of the federal crop insurance corporation, reported today.

The director said counties to come under the 1948 program would likely be only those in the eastern part of the state where wheat is the principal crop. He explained that the compromise bill of the house and senate had eliminated the others.

## Experimental Area Field Day Slated For July 31

Dr. D. D. Hill and H. A. Schoth of Oregon State college will be participants in the Klamath experimental area field day on July 31. Dr. Hill is head of the farm crops department at Oregon State college and a member of the Klamath experimental area advisory committee. Schoth is in charge of forage crop investigations at Oregon State college for the U. S. department of Agriculture and is an outstanding authority on forage crops.

The tour of the experimental plots will begin at 10 a. m. and continue into the afternoon with time out for lunch served by the station at noon.

Extensive cereal variety tests of spring oats, wheat and barley and fall wheat and barley will be seen this year. Some of these varieties appear to be especially adapted to the Klamath area. Utah winter barley and allied wheat are two strains introduced by the station that are finding a place in the agriculture of this area. New, high yielding varieties of spring oats may be released to farmers this fall if they perform as well this year as they have previously. New disease resistant spring wheat varieties are also in prospect.

These cereal trials have been planted on the main station west of the airport and also on the Muck experimental area near Worden. Both areas will be visited during the day.

A potato disease demonstration showing many of the common and some uncommon virus diseases of potatoes will be of interest to potato growers in this area.

These demonstrations are provided for potato growers of this area to assist them in recognizing diseases that affect the production of seed and commercial potatoes. Over 50 potato varieties are in a
