Fear Of Saboteurs Interrupts Party

SAN PEDRO, Calif., July 31 (AP)—Fears of possible saboteurs interrupted a party last night aboard H. M. S. Kenya, 11,000-ton British cruiser here on a goodwill tour, and a small demolition charge was set off as a protective measure in the water nearby where mysterious bubbles were arising.
However Lt. John Stewart-Moore, executive deck officer, said an investigation disclosed that the bubbles were caused by an auxiliary engine of the Kenya and the party proceeded without further incident. Earlier in the day it was reported that the British consulate received a telephone call protesting the Kenya's visit here.

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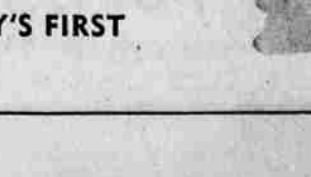
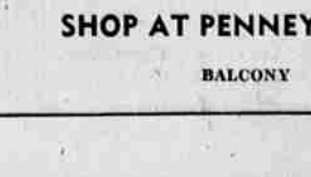
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
