

Tulelake Shows Expansion As New Motels, Clothing Stores Near Completion

TULELAKE, Calif., Aug. 1 — A steady building program that has increased as summer advanced is adding numerous new enterprises to the town and surrounding community.

Largest of the programs now under way is the Park motel, one-half mile south of town, that when completed will be one of the most modern and attractive in the basin. Co-owners of the property are Mr. and Mrs. Phil Park, formerly of Eugene and Los Angeles who will be active managers and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Osborne, Tulelake. Osborne is a well known potato grower here.

Plans for this structure call for a horseshoe shaped arrangement of 20 units, 12 to be built immediately and eight larger units at a later date. The apartments will face the Alura highway with 30-foot paved driveways, providing admittance to the motel. Driveways will be built up to the door and no sidewalks will be used. The building will be of pumice brick made in Tulelake with red brick trim.

All steel window casements with a crank type opener to provide ease of operation will be installed.

All floors will be concrete with heavy felt pads and carpeting, and chrome "Lumaline" lights will be one of the new features.

One-half of the rooms will be provided with double, and one-half with single beds. Rooms will have soundproof eight-inch tile walls and a tunnel beneath the building will provide steam heat. Baked enamel tile showers will be provided in each unit.

A well drilled recently, dipped into an exceptional supply of soft water after going through a strata of black sand.

Living accommodations, including living room, bedroom, dining space, kitchen and bath and the office, will occupy part of the building.

Karl Gentry, Tulelake, is the designer and builder. Cost of construction will probably exceed \$100,000. Construction should be completed by November 1.

Park, a graduate of the University of Oregon, where he received his masters degree, taught for 10 years in the Eugene high school before going to Los Angeles where he was in real estate for more than a year before coming here to locate. Mrs. Park is at present with the Bank of America, Tulelake branch.

A second large building is going up for Dick Reeder and DeLos Mills, both of Klamath Falls, to be occupied by a men's clothing store and possibly other departments.

This building of red hollow tile is being put up on Main street at a cost of approximately \$40,000. It will be of two-story construction, the first floor to be occupied by the business enterprise and the second by apartments.

Floor space is 50 by 150 and Leckers and Duncan, Klamath Falls, are the contractors. Completion by November 1 is anticipated.

Also under construction on the highway north of town is a ready mix concrete plant by the W. D. Miller Construction company. A one-man set-up, an outside elevator conducts sand and rock to six big bins, the materials going into a batching machine to be ready for dumping into trucks.

A pier of the Southern Pacific is to be built to the location at an early date.

Miller bought the property recently and owns also the location formerly occupied by the Frank Bell Machinery company, now the new home of the Gresham Motors.

A new farm home that will be of the modern California type is going up for Mr. and Mrs. Earl Ager on their farm on the highway, that was once the Art Laundry place.

The exterior will be of cedar siding with wide overhang eaves, and the house will have three bedrooms, living room, dining room, rumpus room, kitchen, utility room, two baths and two-car garage.

Sheldon Brumbaugh is the architect, and the contractors are Leckers and Duncan, all of Klamath Falls.

This home will be 250 feet from the highway to provide for landscaping and is expected to be ready for occupancy about the first of the year.

Mr. and Mrs. Ager were among the first comers to Tulelake prior to opening the first homesteads.

Dutch Consul Has Lots Of Company

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1 (AP)—Dr. Adrian Hartog, Netherlands' consul here, was surprised when five men presented themselves at his office yesterday for picket duty.

He directed them to the street seven floors below where 40 persons carried placards protesting the war in Indonesia.

Later a spokesman for the pickets presented a resolution demanding withdrawal of Dutch troops. Dr. Hartog politely gave them a written reply explaining his government's position.

Seed Cleaning Plant Built

Construction is under way on the Great Northern at Henley, one-half mile west of the school where a seed cleaning plant for Howard Dixon, Henley farmer, is being built. Dixon has operated a small plant at the site for eight years.

The Quonset steel structure will be 10 feet higher than the average to provide space for installation of equipment and will have a floor space 60 by 80 feet. Cleaning capacity will be several times greater than at present and the business will be equipped to clean small seeds

as well as grain. Truck scales will also be installed and provisions made for bulk grain loading.

Dixon plans to enlarge in the near future for grinding and mixing feeds. Equipment is en route to install for this department. The steel structure was purchased through Kandra and Noggle, Tulelake.

Commodore Slika, commander, 13th coast guard district, announced today that the American defense service medals and A-E clasps and World War II victory medals are now ready for distribution to all eligible ex-United States coast guard and ex-United States public health service personnel who served with the coast guard during World War II. These medals may be obtained by appearing in person at Room 1009, Falling Bldg., Portland, Oregon with Form NAVCG-553 "Notice of Separation from the United States Naval Service-Coast Guard." Form NAVCG-2742 "Disenrollment, Temporary Member United States Coast Guard," discharge certificate or other official proof of eligibility for these awards. If a personal appearance is not practicable, a written request, including proof of eligibility for the awards, may be addressed to the Commandant (PMD), United States Coast Guard, Washington 25, D. C. Area campaign medals will not be distributed at this time.

Former Democratic Senator Passes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Harry B. Hawes, former democratic senator from Missouri, died at his home here last night. He was 78.

Since retiring from the senate in 1933 he had practiced law here, representing both the Philippine government and the Philippine Sugar association in a legal capacity.

Hawes was elected to the senate in 1926 after serving three terms in the house. He did not seek re-election in 1932.

Navy Medals To Be Given

The navy recruiting station in Klamath Falls has announced that the recruiting office has received the American defense medal, Victory medal, fleet and base clasps. These medals and clasps will be issued to personnel who have received an honorable or under honorable condition discharge from the USN, USNR or USN-1 who served on active duty at any time between September 8, 1939, and December 31, 1946, both dates inclusive.

Those eligible to receive the American defense medal, also a fleet or base clasp, are those that served on active duty between September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941. Those eligible to receive the World War II Victory medal are those that served on active duty at any time between December 1, 1941, and December 31, 1946.

At the present time these medals will be issued at the navy recruiting office, room 307, in the post office building between the hours of 8 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. beginning Monday, August 4. The above medals will be issued only to those presenting either their discharge or original separation sheet, the 553. This applies to all enlisted personnel, Waves and officers included. Arrangements will be made to distribute the above medals to outlying districts, on regular recruiting trips. Men should watch for time and date of the recruiters' visit.


