

Bricker Gets Threatening Phone Calls

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 1 (AP)—Police disclosed today that Senator John W. Bricker (R-Ohio) had received two threatening telephone calls yesterday and that as a result extraordinary precautions were taken to guard him at the republican rally here last night.

One of the telephone calls, which police said they believed were made by "franks," was made to the Bricker home in suburban Upper Arlington a few hours before the senator was to take part in a statewide dinner honoring Senator Robert A. Taft (R-Ohio). The call was taken by the senator's mother-in-law, Mrs. Maud A. Day, who reported that the caller said: "This time we're going to get him."

Three weeks ago Senator Bricker was fired upon in Washington by a former capitol policeman. The other telephone call was made to Bricker's law office in the downtown Leveque-Lincoln Towers office building.

A squad of detectives surrounded Bricker as he appeared at the Neil house for the dinner last night and at the conclusion, he was escorted out a rear door by the officers.

A thorough search also was made of the grounds of the Bricker residence in Tremont road in Upper Arlington.

Bricker did not appear unnerved by the telephone calls, persons who attended the dinner reported. He sat near the speaker's platform at a table, and introduced Senator Taft before the latter's address.

Royal Wedding Date Named

LONDON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Princess Elizabeth and Lt. Philip Mountbatten will be married November 20 at Westminster Abbey, Buckingham Palace announced tonight. "The king and queen have approved that the marriage of Princess Elizabeth and Lt. Philip Mountbatten shall take place at Westminster Abbey at 11:30 a. m., on Thursday, 20th November, 1947," the brief statement said.

The betrothal of the heiress presumptive and the former Greek Prince had been given formal approval before the privy council at the palace earlier today.

Roosevelt To Face Hearing

BOSTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Elliott Roosevelt said today that next Monday in Washington "I'll say my piece" before a senate committee investigating war contracts awarded planemaker Howard Hughes and shipbuilder Henry J. Kaiser.

The son of the late president told newsmen at Boston airport that he was not subpoenaed, but had been asked to appear before the committee by Sen. Owen Brewster (R-Maine).

"I imagine they want my version," Roosevelt added. Sen. Pepper (D-Fla.) declared yesterday that Roosevelt had grounds for purportedly pushing wartime construction of a Hughes photo-reconnaissance plane and also remarked:

"I have no doubt that it will be shown Elliott Roosevelt accepted entertainment from representatives of Hughes."

Asked about that, Roosevelt answered: "I'll say my piece when I reach Washington."

Reds Charged By Greece

LAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 1 (AP)—Greece formally charged Russia's three Balkan satellites Thursday with aggression in a drastic new move aimed at countering the Soviet Union's veto of an American proposal for an 11-member United Nations border commission.

Greek Ambassador Vassili Dendramis handed the complaint to Ivan Kerno, assistant secretary general, shortly after 3 p. m., as the United Nations security council met to consider the Indonesian and Balkan cases.

Dendramis said that he had submitted the complaint under chapter seven of the UN charter. By bringing the Balkan case before the veto-throttled security council in a more drastic manner, Greece has now charged Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and Albania with aggression.

Portland Engineer To Retire

PORTLAND, Aug. 1 (AP)—After 46 years' service with the Portland district army engineers, Richard W. Williams retired Thursday.

More than 250 employees of the district honored him at a luncheon at which Col. O. E. Walsh lauded his work.

Born at Salem January 22, 1878, he was graduated from Willamette university in 1898 and the next year became a recorder for an army engineers' surveying party. Since then he has aided in numerous surveys.

TACOMA, Aug. 1 (AP)—"Lennie," the popular pet—and impotent—polecat, whose homeless plight brought offers of adoption from some 300 would-be owners, was restored by city pound officials today to his rightful owner, thereby spiking the only skunk auction to be planned in these parts.

Owner Edwin Melvin posed out five other former skunk owners, who had laid claims to Lennie, by accurate statements as to certain disfigurements and markings to the satisfaction of attendants.

Several hundred other prospective skunk owners, who were to have had a chance to bid on Lennie at an auction slated for Saturday, will have to corner their own wood-pussies, A. T. Snow, city stockman, indicated.

SUSANVILLE, Calif., Aug. 1.—Mrs. Georgia Vason, 53, of Lincoln, Calif., died at 7:30 a. m. Wednesday as a result of injuries received in an auto crash near Milford, Calif., early Sunday morning. John Horn, driver of the car which struck the car in which Mrs. Vason was riding, has been charged with involuntary manslaughter by the California highway patrol. Horn, 42, is a negro residing in Heriotes, Calif.

The accident occurred when Horn, driving on the left side of the road, hit the other car head on. In a critical condition are Marcelino Gardiola, 44, and Stefan Plaza, 44, of Calneva, Calif., who were both riding with Horn.
