Bulgars Hold U.S. Citizen

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Aug. 2 (AP)—American sources said today that Stephen Thuransky, a U. S. citizen who said he was an agent for the International Harvester Co., was arrested last night by armed Hungarian political police at Balassagyarmat, on the Czechoslovak border northeast of Budapest.

The informant said the American legation had protested the arrest and was told by the political police that Thuransky had been arrested on "serious charges" of "undemocratic utterances" and would be brought to Budapest for trial. A representative of the legation was sent to Balassagyarmat.

A spokesman for Foreign Minister Erno Mihalffy said there had been no official information on the arrest of any American citizen but the penal code of 1934 listed numerous offenses with which foreigners could be arrested in Hungary. A representative of the American legation said that although Thuransky was an agent for International Harvester, he had not been able to make any sales during the last year and had established a general hauling company.

Freak Pistol Shot Kills Youth

SILVERTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—A freak pistol shot killed Maurice Verbeck, 20, yesterday in front of his fiancée, Esther Albrecht, who was visiting at the Verbeck home here. Verbeck had placed the .22 caliber weapon on the davenport earlier. Then the couple went to Salem for a visit. They returned after midnight, and Verbeck started to pick up the pistol to return it to his room. It was entangled in a coat and blanket and fired when he tried to free it.

Interior Department Opens Land Along Alaska Highway For Settlement

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—The interior department today opened the land along the Alaska highway to settlement—with reservations and a word of caution.

The department approved an order by the bureau of land management opening to public use 338 miles of the highway—the 202-mile main section from the Yukon boundary to the junction with the Richardson highway leading to Fairbanks and the 136-mile Gulkana cutoff toward the coast.

At the same time, the bureau said initial settlements will be allowed only at the most favorable points, now being surveyed. War veterans will be given a 90-day preference in consideration of applications.

Slain Jew's Body Found

JERUSALEM, Aug. 2 (AP)—An unidentified Jew was found slain today on a roadside near Petah Tiqva east of Tel Aviv.

Authorities expressed belief he was one of two Jews reported abducted by English-speaking men in army uniforms south of Tel Aviv about two weeks ago.

Edward Curtis of the Associated Press reported from Tel Aviv that a taxicab driver told him he found the body at 10 a. m., and estimated that the Jew had been dead 12 hours. Two Arabs rear the scene said, Curtis reported, that they had seen the body hurled from a passing truck a short time earlier.

CG Blows Up Jap Mine Off Astoria

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—A Japanese mine that drifted among fishing boats offshore was exploded yesterday by coastguardsmen.

It was a 500-pound mine found bobbing only eight miles from regular northbound coastal shipping lanes. It was first sighted Wednesday 50 miles off Grays Harbor by the fishing boat Florence A. The coast guard cutter Papaw closed in for the kill.

"Hose" Turns On Scared Housewife

BELLEVILLE, Ill., Aug. 2 (AP)—When Mrs. Harold Metzger grabbed for what she thought was the garden hose in her basement, it started to uncoil and grab right back at her. She ran screaming from the basement. Neighbors called police. Patrolmen with clubs subdued the "hose"—a three-foot black snake.

Pickets Ring Tacoma Hotel

TACOMA, Aug. 2 (AP)—Picket lines went up at 6 a. m. this morning around two of Tacoma's leading hotels and two private clubs as the Cooks, Waiters, Waitresses and Bartenders' union, local No. 81 (AFL), struck to enforce wage demands.

Affected were the Hotel Winthrop and Tacoma hotel, the University-Union club and the Elks club. Also hit by the strike but not actually picketed because of its location—the top two floors of the Washington building—was the Tacoma club.

According to Charles E. McDonald, union business agent and chairman of the joint strike committee, negotiations with the two hotels and three club have broken down completely after two months of negotiations and at present, no further meetings are scheduled. Approximately 300 employees will be involved.

A city-wide ping-pong tournament will get underway Monday at the five Klamath Falls playgrounds. Sponsored by the city recreation department, each playground will hold its preliminary contests Wednesday, August 6, and final playoffs have been scheduled for Friday, August 8, at Klamath Union high school.
