Frick Would Shift Cards To Chicago

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—Ford Frick favors placing a second National league baseball club in Chicago.

Discussion of the California situation, with one camp demanding major recognition for the Pacific Coast league and another insisting the National and American leagues place teams in Los Angeles and San Francisco inevitably has brought up the St. Louis problem.

President Ford Frick of the National circuit indicates that talk of moving a St. Louis team, either the Browns or the Cards, to LA is just so much conversation.

If Los Angeles and San Francisco were pre-empted by the major company they would go into one league and make the long travel jump to the coast financially feasible.

"My idea is to transfer the Cardinals to Chicago's west side and leave the St. Louis to the American league," explains Frick.

"Getting the Cardinals into Detroit seems impossible. I am casting no aspersions on St. Louis as a baseball center. We are doing mighty well there, but the Browns are not. Eventually something will have to be done about that."

"The most intense rivalry, the greatest box office boom in the National league, lies in the 22 games between the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers annually.

"No matter whether there be boom or depression, no matter where the clubs may be standing, the series provides a race within a race. It's good for more than a half million admissions any old year."

"If the Cardinals were shifted to Chicago's west side, they would develop a bit rivalry with the Cubs. The west side of Chicago is a vast territory which could easily build up its own particular baseball allegiance."

Frick's idea is just as nebulous as the others, but at least it has the advantage of being seriously considered by some big baseball men. The Chicago Cubs long years ago played on the west side, but when the Federal league folded in 1916 the Cubs took over that location.

Valuable Dogs Expected In For Fall Retriever Trials

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5 (AP)—For the first time in five years the lightweight boxing division has an undisputed king— Ike Williams, the Trenton, N. J., Negro with dynamite in his right fist.

Williams, heretofore ruler only in the domain of the National Boxing association, took complete control of the 135 pounders in Philadelphia's municipal stadium last night with a six-round knockout of Bob Montgomery, champion by edict of the New York and Pennsylvania athletic commissions.

The end to the double rule came so suddenly that the crowd of 30,500 hardly realized what had happened. For five rounds the two transplanted southerners had battled furiously with Williams holding the point edge.

Two minutes of the sixth round had passed when the Bobcat straightened up from his usual crooked style of fighting. That was a mistake. For Williams cut loose with a right cross that caught Bob flush on the chin. Down went Montgomery for the count of nine.

It was more by instinct than anything else that Montgomery got to his feet. But he was an easy mark—standing in Ike's corner and taking a two-fisted pasting until he fell to the canvas for the full count. The time was two minutes and 37 seconds.

"I just beat him to the punch," Ike said in his dressing room. "I saw he was getting ready to throw his right so I let mine go first."

Montgomery, marked with a cut under his right eye, explained it thusly: "I straightened up and walked into it."

The threat of rain held the crowd to lower numbers than expected. The gate of \$178,301 also fell before pre-flight estimates. The Philadelphia Inquirer charities were expected to receive in the neighborhood of \$30,000 after Montgomery takes approximately \$28,000 and Williams \$21,500.

He will meet in March the winner of the Ezzard Charles-Ole Tanberg bout slated for New York in December. That also will be a ten-round non-title event.

The opponent to make the best showing against him will be given a crack at the title in a 15-round championship bout in New York next summer.

Then, if he is still undefeated, Joe will retire from the ring.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 5 (AP)—Jim Ferrier of Chicago today added the St. Paul Open golf championship to his professional golfers' association title and \$2,194.69 to his bank account because of a three-stroke victory in a playoff with Fred Haas, Jr., of New Orleans.

Ferrier yesterday toured the 6,432-yard Keller course in 68 strokes, four under par, while Haas had to be content with a 71 and \$1400 plus \$194.69 as his share of the playoff gate. Ferrier's first money was \$2,000 and he received an equal share of the playoff gate.

Dodgers End Loss Streak In Overtime

Dixie Walker Hits Distance In Tenth To Better Braves

By The Associated Press Dixie Walker and Hugh Casey are shining examples of Brooklyn Dodgers President Branch Rickey's theory that a few "old timers" along with the youthful ball players is the prime requisite in the building of a pennant winner.

The apparently ageless Walker and the veteran Casey teamed up last night to end a three-game Dodger losing streak and maintained the Brooks, seven-game lead over the runner-up St. Louis Cardinals in the National league pennant chase.

Walker, flatbush idol since 1938, homered with one on in the tenth inning for a 4-2 triumph by the Dodgers over the Braves in Boston. The circuit clout was the 100th of his major league career.

Casey, who will be 34 in October, received credit for the win, his eighth of the season against three setbacks. The hefty right-hander entered the game in the sixth after the Braves had tied the score at 2-2 and allowed the Bostonians only two safeties the rest of the way.

The Cardinals hung up their fourth straight triumph, drubbing the Chicago Cubs, 8-1, in a day game at Chicago.

Lefty Howie Pollet scattered 10 hits while the Red Birds collected 17 off five Chicago pitchers, including a homer, double and single by Stan Musial.

The loss ended a three-game Chicago winning streak and dropped the Cubs a game and a half behind the fourth-place Cincinnati Reds who took a 7-4 decision from the Pirates in a night game at Pittsburgh.

The Philadelphia Athletics cut the New York Yankees first place margin in the American league to 13 games by outslugging the Yanks, 9-5, in a night game at Yankee stadium.

The rest of the American league and the New York Giants and Philadelphia in the National were idle.

Gracie De Moss Favored To Win

PORTLAND, Aug. 5 (AP)—Gracie De Moss, the 19-year-old driver from Corvallis, was favored today to capture the 30th annual women's city golf championship as the 16 low score qualifiers faced first round play.

Gracie shared medalist honors with two Portland entries after posting 85 for the 18-hole qualifying round yesterday on the par 71 Eastmoreland course. With her were Mrs. Floyd Cocklin and Mrs. Si Sylvester.

Miss De Moss' long drives helped her earn a one-over-par 40 on the first nine, but she took a 45 on the return.

BIG NAME FOOTBALLERS TO ROMP AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 5—Gridiron football fans of the Pacific Northwest will get their first taste of professional football as it will be played during the 1947 season when the Brooklyn Dodgers and Los Angeles Dons clash in Multnomah stadium Sunday night, August 17, at 8:30.

As an added attraction to the battle between two top teams of the All-America football conference, grid fans will have a chance to look over Multnomah stadium's new grass field and brand new aluminum goal posts which will be installed for the first time, as far as is known, in any stadium.

Stadium Manager Jimmy Richardson expects a record crowd for the pro game, with both teams packed with "box office" names. Glenn Dobbs, Martin Ruby, Robert Perina and "Red" Veeema of the Dodgers are sure to give the grandstand some real thrills when they square off against the Dons' Angelo Bertelli, John Kimbrough and Charlie O'Rourke, all of whom are expected to see action in "the game."

Richardson predicts that Marvin Goodman and Larry McKeel, both former Willamette university stars now playing with the Dodgers, and Boyd Clement, ex-Oregon State college, now training with the Dons, will get into the Portland game. Training camp reports indicate these native sons of Oregon are in the running for regular berths.
