

Phil Sampson TKO's Hoag

Gregory Battered By Monte

Southpaw Phil Sampson, a comer in the welterweight division if there ever was one, added another scalp to his collection last night in the armory by slugging out a technical kayo over durable Duane Hoag in the fourth round of their scheduled 10-stanza engagement.

Sampson took every round and virtually every point although Hoag didn't give up easily. The tough Portland youngster had occasion twice to pick himself off the canvas.

In the first round the Buzzsaw started fast in his accustomed leather-flurry style, but Sampson nailed him with a right that flipped Hoag against the ropes, then draped him over the second strand with another right. Hoag came back mad, waving Sampson in and Phil connected with a left hook that sat Hoag down for no count. Duane was hurt and rather surprised but still grinning when the round was over.

Hoag started the second heat fast but promptly was slowed down by catching a slam into his head and another to the pit of his stomach. He was swinging wild and not getting anywhere as the stanza ended. The third was a good clean round, more boxing than slugging, and Sampson once moved away when he had Hoag wide open on the ropes. The big crowd approved that move.

Early in the fourth heat Sampson caught Hoag's jaw flush with a right hand that spun Duane into the ropes and a follow-up punch sent him down for a count. Duane got up fighting but was in a bad way and hanging on when Referee Wally Moss stopped the fight.

The win was Sampson's third straight in the local ring. He weighed 136, Hoag 133.

Monte Montgomery got a TKO over Chris Gregory of Seattle in the second round of their scheduled lightweight 10 rounder when Gregory's handlers tossed in the towel just at the close of the heat.

A savage overhand right to the jaw dazed Gregory in the first round and he was just a target from then on in although that punch didn't knock him down. A right to the head put Gregory on the deck for 10 in the second and when he got up another sat him down for 7. He got up again and Monte was slugging him unmercifully when Gregory's handlers decided to call it quits.

Billy Sunday took a highly disputed split decision over Dick Wolfe in the middleweight special event after losing one round, the fourth, for hitting low. Sunday was the aggressor every round but several times his blows were dangerously close to a looping right hand smashing in the final canto.

The preliminaries saw the popular George Price of Merrill take a lightweight decision from Benny Mitchell, while Herb Snell decided Don Piccard in the lightweight opener.

Snapp Draws With Jimenez

SEATTLE, Aug. 6 (AP)—Jack (Ginger) Snapp, showing that he is still relatively inexperienced in the ring, had to rally fast in the last two rounds last night to earn a draw with Pedro Jimenez of Vallejo, Calif., in the main event.

Snapp was two rounds down to Jimenez at the close of the eighth but perked up and grabbed the points for the next two for a split. He weighed 161, Jimenez 159. The draw was the first of Snapp's professional career.

Johnny Mize Ahead Of Bambino's Mark

It is still anybody's race in the National League and as long as big Johnny Mize keeps clouting those long ones, the homer hitting New York Giants are not to be sold short.

Mize not only is keeping the Giants very much in the pennant fight, but is seriously threatening what is probably the greatest batting feat in baseball—Babe Ruth's record of 60 home runs in the 1927 season.

The hard hitting first baseman walloped two into the Polo Grounds stands last night to lead the Giants to a 5-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies. The victory, coupled with the Braves' 4-2 win over Brooklyn in Boston reduced the league leading Dodgers' margin over the third place Giants to seven games.

The runner-up St. Louis Cards now trail the Dodgers by six games following their 8-3 triumph over the Cubs in a day-light game in Chicago. The Braves, in fourth place, are 10 games off the pace.

Mize's pair of round trippers, his 33rd and 34th of the season came in the Giants' 96th game and put him two games ahead of Ruth's record setting pace.

Johnny Sain pitched and batted the Braves to their victory over the Dodgers before 29,987 home night game fans. The big right-hander, who scattered nine hits for his 15th victory, rapped two hits, driving in the first Boston run and scoring the next one on Johnny Hopp's right field single. Hank Camelli's sixth inning double off losing pitcher Hal Gregg scored two runners and broke up a 2-2 deadlock.

A home run with the bases loaded by Catcher Del Rice and another round tripper by Whitey Kurowski highlighted a six-run fourth inning and helped Harry Brecheen and the Cards to gain an easy win.

Taking advantage of 10 bases on balls to add to their 11 hits, four Cincinnati hurlers, the Pittsburgh Pirates disposed of the Reds in Pittsburgh 12-4. Hank Greenberg drove in three runs to raise his season's output to 63 for the Bucs this season.

The Yankees stretched their American League lead to 14 games over the runner-up Boston Red Sox by defeating the Athletics in Philadelphia 8-5 in a night game while the Sox were losing a 3-1 decision to the Senators in Washington.

The Cleveland Indians downed the Tigers in a twilight game at Detroit 8-4.

Ed Lopat handcuffed the Browns in St. Louis with four hits in pitching the Chicago White Sox to a 5-1 night game victory.
