

Rail Rate Cut Demanded

SEATTLE, Aug. 6 (P)—A complaint against 980 railroads demanding a 30 per cent cut in railroad freight rates for shippers west of the Rocky mountains was passed the Monday upon the interstate commerce commission by the Pacific traffic bureau.

The complaint is the biggest rate ever filed with the ICC and ultimately involve hundreds of shippers, thousands of witnesses and cost of at least \$200,000, according to Clyde Austin, president of the bureau which represents numerous west coast shippers.

Austin said public support for the rate campaign will be sought at a Portland meeting August 13. The meeting will be attended by mayors and civic leaders of Washington and Oregon cities.

The complaint charges rates are 10 per cent higher in the west than the industrial east and demands equalization by raising in the east and lowering in the west.

The Pacific bureau was announced by Attorney General Smith

Troy yesterday as consultant to Washington state in a complaint which Troy has filed with the ICC seeking a 10 per cent cut in western rail rates. The bureau's services will be without cost to the state, Troy said.

Ike Urges Firm Policy

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 6 (P)—Americans must be "firm and patient, keep their sense of humor—and keep their powder dry," General Dwight D. Eisenhower said yesterday in a radio broadcast over a territorial network.

The first U. S. army chief of staff to view the continent's northernmost bastions of defense, Eisenhower said the United States must maintain a powerful military establishment, with emphasis on an aerial arm.

"Ours is only one of many philosophies of life," he said. "We have no objection to others living under dictatorships if that is what they want. But when others of unlike philosophies announce that our form of life is antagonistic to their

future, we must look to our own strength.

"No nation went into the United Nations organization with warmer purposes than ours. What we see happening at this date is only an indication of the circle of threatening potentialities," he added.

At a news conference later, the general said the apparent abandonment of Aleutian bases is in effect not an abandonment at all but a "contraction and concentration of military potential in accordance with available cash and manpower."

The framework of strategic bases is being kept intact for rapid expansion if necessary, he said.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON TO CONSTRUCT

AND LAY SEWER IN THE PORTION OF PRECINCT NO. 23 LYING TO THE NORTHEAST OF SOUTH SIXTH STREET AND ESTIMATES THEREFOR FILED BY THE CITY ENGINEER AND DIRECTING CERTAIN STEPS BE TAKEN SAID PROJECT

TO BE KNOWN AS SEWER UNIT NO. 17.

The City Engineer of the City of Klamath Falls pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of constructing and laying what is to be known as the 17th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, located in that portion of Precinct No. 23, lying to the northeast of South Sixth Street, embracing in said unit all of the property hereinafter bounded and described, and the Common Council having taken said plans, specifications and estimates under consideration, now finds them satisfactory.

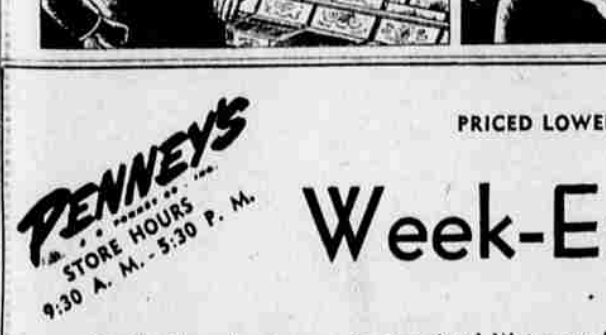
