### Crop Duster Names Unit

### WTC To Build Sulphate Plant

TACOMA, Aug. 7 (AP)—J. P. Weyerhaeuser Jr., president of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, announced today that his company will construct a sulphate plant at Springfield, Ore., as part of the timber firm's \$30,000,000 general construction program.

Weyerhaeuser said it was difficult to set a monetary value on the construction at Springfield, but lumber officials reported such projects are "very expensive and run into the millions of dollars."

The output of the new plant, which will be integrated with the lumber mill being constructed on the same site the sulphate works will occupy, will be used in container board manufacture, the announcement said.

"The unbleached sulphate container board mill offered the most suitable means of utilizing waste that develops incidental to lumbering and sawmill operations," Weyerhaeuser said.

## DAV To Issue Vet Medals

The Klamath Falls chapter of the Disabled American Veterans announces plans for the issuance of victory medals, American defense service medals, and foreign service clasps to eligible veterans.

Jack Benner, service officer of the chapter, said today that the chapter's job is to notify veterans of the plan and determine how many are entitled to the awards. The DAV is trying to contact all veterans, not only its own members.

Interested veterans are asked to contact Bob Hugelman, DAV adjutant, at the state employment office or at 1404 Nimitz, his home. In all cases the awards are made only for honorable active general military service. Requirements for the American defense service medal are service between September 8, 1939, and December 7, 1941 under orders to active duty for a period of 12 months or longer.

Veterans eligible for the foreign service clasp are those who served outside the continental United States, including service in Alaska or as a crew member of a vessel or as a member of an operating crew of an airplane serving over ocean waters.

Service between December 7, 1941, and December 31, 1946, qualifies a veteran for the World War II victory medal.

## Vet Building Plan Talked

A meeting has been called for all veterans interested in the cooperative purchase of a downtown business building for Tuesday, August 12, at 8 p. m.

M. J. Shumate, who is working on the plan, urges all interested veterans to be on hand at the Legion hall. Should the project be carried out, veterans would be able to locate in the building with store and office space. Contributing veterans would be given first choice.

Shumate said that the procedure would probably be that veterans would use GI loans for purchase and remodeling, if necessary, in securing the structure.

Assistance is being given by the American Legion, post 8, which is notifying veterans of the meeting through its organization.

## Farm Bureau Hears Schaupt

Arthur Schaupt, local attorney and farmer, discussed hunting and trespassing laws at a dinner meeting of the board of directors of the Klamath County Farm Bureau, Tuesday evening, saying that "trespassing is a public relations problem between hunters and farmers."

"It's a problem involving conflict between a hunter's privileges and a farmer's rights," Schaupt said. He read and explained the state's laws on the subject.

Delegates from seven farm communities, present at the meeting held in the Pelican party room, will talk over the points brought out by Schaupt at their next center meetings.

Other features of the meeting included: Frank Brown's report on the local alkali and barley situation and the latest statistics on grain exports as influenced by world conditions. Brown is field crops chairman.

Lee Holliday reported for Scott Warren on the August 1 potato meeting at Merrill in regard to potato marketing agreements.

Mrs. T. D. Jackson, associated women's chairman, reported on a book club for bureau members which would make available to farm families books on technical subjects, juvenile books and fiction.

## U.S. Protests Oil Seizure

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (AP)—The state department announced today that the United States had joined in a strong British protest to the Russians against the seizure of the Lobau oil refinery near Vienna.

Ownership of the refinery has been claimed by the Americans and British as being vested jointly in the American Vacuum oil and British Shell oil companies.

The Russians seized the property last Saturday while a four-power Austrian treaty commission was looking into questions of German assets and their susceptibility to seizure by the Soviets.

The German assets issue is a critical one between the western powers and Russia in the problem of trying to arrive at an Austrian settlement.

## Grains Quiet On Market

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (AP)—Grains backed and filled without getting far in either direction on the board of trade today. Turnover was the lightest of the week.

Corn again assumed market leadership. At the start prices were off slightly on localized overnight showers, but no important selling developed and the market thereafter recovered and held steady.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher, September \$2.33. The loss was shown by the July contract, in which trading started yesterday. Corn ended 1/4-1/8 higher, September \$2.24-2.23 1/2, and oats were 1 cent to 1 1/4 higher, September 99 1/2.

## Britain Puts Tax On Movies

LONDON, Aug. 7 (AP)—Britain imposed a 75 per cent tax tonight on the estimated earnings of all motion pictures imported into the country.

Prime Minister Attlee said yesterday only 25 per cent of the film's earnings would be remitted abroad. The treasury disclosed tonight that the other 75 per cent would be taken as duty rather than impounded in sterling accounts, as some companies had expected.

The heaviest payers will be American producers, who took approximately \$68,000,000 out of Britain last year.

The treasury announced the duty would be collected as a "300 per cent ad valorem" payment, but details of the tax showed this would amount to 75 per cent of the pictures' net earnings.

The new tax applies on all motion picture imports, beginning today.

The term "high seas" refers to all oceans outside of territorial waters.
