

# State Solons Worry Over Labor Bill

Two Oregon congressmen, back from Washington, D. C., were warning constituents today that they feared more trouble in industry-labor relations.

Both blamed the Taft-Hartley act. At Eugene Senator Wayne Morse called it "bootleg" legislation, the worst since the 18th amendment.

In Portland Rep. Homer D. Angell said it was fomenting trouble because it was "too inclusive... they put everything restrictive to labor in the measure."

Morse said the act was bringing about "bootleg" labor contracts "in clear violation of the law, but in an attempt to get around the law."

Angell also told how the Oregon delegation mustered votes for Bonneville transmission lines, a measure passing by six votes.

"Ellsworth, Norblad and I stood at the doors of the house and talked to every member who went on the floor. We must have gained at least 100 votes that way. Rep. Lowell Stockman, who opposed the lines, took no part in our effort," Angell said.

Angell added they asked for the votes "as personal favors... a dangerous thing to do as they might come back at the three of us later and ask for similar favors."

She still comes back half-a-day each week for old times' sake and makes our house loud with her laughter. I think she has the gladdest heart of anyone I ever knew.

Jeanie is a maid, a husky, friendly negro girl with white teeth, dark eyes and a complexion as soft as the patina on old rosewood. She isn't just an ordinary maid. She's the kind that housewives fight and scheme against each other for. Most any woman would risk losing her dearest friend to lure Jeanie away.

She came here years ago from California to be again with the sister who raised her and their mother died. During the sad years of the depression when jobs were scarce,

—Jeanie became her family's loyal breadwinner. She was the only one able to find work. Jeanie could never be out of a job. Scripping wifes would tear up the household budget rather than let Jeanie go.

**Depression Job**

She first started coming to our house when the depression was lifting. She got fifty cents an hour then and worked for half a dozen people. The first day she came she rather depressed my wife.

"She works so fast," said Frances. "I can't tell her enough things to do to keep her busy."

When she left, the place was spick-and-span in a new way. She has been coming ever since. Each time before leaving she accepts a good nip of something to keep her warm on the subway ride up to Harlem. I think she rubs some of her own warm grin into the house-

hold her and silver, for they gleam as they never did before.

Jeanie gets so much fun out of her work it makes some people envious. Her hobby is baseball. I don't think she has ever gone to a game, but she listens to them on the radio and reads all the newspaper accounts. For a while she worked Saturday afternoons in a hand laundry. It was hot hard work in summertime ironing the shirts, and she used to turn on the radio to listen to the ball game.

Once she got tickled over a play and laughed so loud the proprietor, soured from years of washing other people's linen, exclaimed crossly: "You have so much fun I think you should be paying me to work here."

Jeanie, who knew she did more work than any two other girls, just laughed at him and said, "I never could help enjoying myself."

**Ritz Job**

During the war she got a maid's job on the staff of a ritzy midtown apartment hotel, and ever since she's been in the big money. The rich people there have really taken care of her. A girl like Jeanie doesn't come their way often. They like to

tell her their tangled marital troubles, and they like the luster she leaves behind. Whatever she lifts her work-worn hands from shines.

The \$45-a-week salary is the smaller part of her earnings. Her tips are liberal and the wealthy women give her discarded dresses more expensive than she could buy herself. One woman gave her \$10 a week extra and, leaving for the summer, she handed Jeanie \$75 and said: "Just look into my apartment every once in a while."

But in the evenings and on her day off Jeanie still comes back—tireless and merry—to clean for friends and merry—to clean for friends and merry—in leaner days. One old lady in financial straits for whom Jeanie still labors an entire evening for one dollar in remembrance of past kindnesses, said:

"I'll bet you've got a few hundred dollars hidden behind a picture somewhere."

Jeanie laughed and laughed—because she's probably got thousands. All these years she's been saving for the time when she could have a home of her own to stay in and keep clean. She's cleaned so many homes

for other people.

She laughs all the time now. For soon her boy friend is getting out of the navy.
