Moore Park Bus Stopped

Busday buses to Moore park have been discontinued according to L. W. Soukup, of the Klamath Bus company, as the service has not proved successful. Soukup stated that a bus line to the park could not be operated when as few as 20 people make use of the Sunday trips.

Bus service for California avenue residents will begin as soon as no-parking signs are placed on the west side of the avenue by the city police department. Soukup said that the schedule for the bus has been made and the route of the Oregon avenue bus will be extended to include the California section. Buses will travel out Oregon avenue and back to Main by way of California avenue.

They will operate on the following schedule, leaving Main street at 7:10 a. m., 7:40 a. m., 9:10 a. m., 9:40 a. m., 11:40 a. m., 1:10 p. m., 3:10 p. m., 3:40 p. m., 5:10 p. m., 5:40 p. m., 7:10 p. m., 9:40 p. m., 11:10 p. m. and 11:40 p. m. Buses will leave Oregon avenue and Blehn on the same schedule, but approximately 10 minutes later.

Concerning bus service to Wocus, Soukup said that it will be continued for several more weeks to see if business improves. Four trips are made a week, two on Monday and two on Friday.
