Corn Price Soars Today

CHICAGO, Aug. 9 (AP)—Corn set the pace for a grain market which roared ahead into new high territory with turnover heavy on the board of trade today.

Corn soared as much as 8 cents a bushel, the limit permitted in a single session, and again marked up a new set of all-time records. Wheat and oats were very strong, making larger gains than any other day this week.

The September corn contract sold at \$2.38 1/2, up 8 cents and a new all-time high for any corn future. In the cash market, yellow corn brought as much as \$2.48 a bushel, more than 10 cents higher than the August, 1917, record of \$2.36 1/2 which had stood until yesterday.

Corn closed 7 1/2 to 8 cents higher, all but the new July contract ending at the limit advance, September \$2.38 1/2. Wheat was 1/4 lower to 1/2 cents higher, September \$2.39 1/2 to \$2.40. The loss was shown by the inactive July contract. Oats were 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 higher, September \$1.05 1/2 to \$1.05.

Vote Due In Timber Strike

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—Employees of one of 13 strikebound wood industry plants in the Inland Empire will vote today at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, whether to accept a wage offer expected to be the pattern for negotiations involving 5500 CIO members.

O. D. Armstrong, spokesman for the Northwest regional negotiating committee of the CIO International of Woodworkers of America, reported the Ohio Match company, Coeur d'Alene, had offered a 5-cent an hour general increase and a base minimum of \$1.30 an hour.

Armstrong said the figure would represent the basis of negotiation with other operators and would help eliminate the differential existing between the pine and fir belt mills. The union originally asked \$1.32 1/2 an hour when negotiations opened.

The CIO workers struck Thursday. Company representatives were not available for comment.

Portland Wheat Market Active

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9 (AP)—The most active cash wheat market so far this season was reported today by the U. S. department of agriculture for this week.

The weekly grain market review said the margin between bids and offers was very narrow throughout the week, particularly on export classes of wheat. Both the commodity credit corporation and milling interests were buying export flour.

Premiums on high protein dark hard winter wheat declined 5 cents a bushel, reflecting a similar drop in Eastern cash markets. Columbia river terminals received 678 cars during the period, compared to 391 the previous week.

Diver Seeks Sunken Plane

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—A diver working from a navy salvage vessel sought today to locate the sunken wreck of a two-engine American Airlines experimental plane which plunged into Bowers bay off La Guardia airport last night, carrying three of the five crewmen aboard to their deaths.

The plane crashed while the pilot, Capt. Walter A. Davidson, 34, of Wantagh, N. Y., was attempting an emergency landing shortly after taking off for Buffalo. Two members of the crew were rescued by a police launch in the few minutes before the plane settled in 45 feet of water.

Dead were the pilot; Co-pilot W. I. Zundel, 28; and H. H. Hickey, a mechanic. Rescued were two other mechanics.

A spokesman for the airline said the plane, "a flying laboratory" used for radar tests, overshot the field while attempting the emergency landing.
