Carnival Man Faces Charge

He is held in the county jail in lieu of \$2500 bail. Stone is alleged to have assaulted H. I. Montgomery of Portland with a beer bottle during a ruckus at the Coney Island cafe Thursday night. Montgomery is in Klamath Valley hospital with a head injury.

John A. Steinhilber, cook at the restaurant and witness to the fight, signed a complaint against Stone. Preliminary police investigation indicated that Montgomery had been struck by a beer bottle, but later probing turned up evidence that he might have been hit with a heavy pottery coffee cup and a chair.

Lake Meters Face Battle

LAKEVIEW, Aug. 9 (AP)—Petitions seeking a referendum election on a parking meter ordinance adopted August 1 by the town council are being circulated here in an effort to head off the installation of meters which is authorized by the ordinance.

The petitions are the result of action by the Lake county chamber of commerce which earlier asked the council to refer the matter to the voters, with the understanding that if the council did not do so, the chamber would circulate the petitions.

The council's move was to contract with the M. H. Rhodes, Inc., of Hartford, Conn., for the installation of about 270 meters in Lakeview to control parking. They stated it is not possible with the present two-man police force to enforce the current two-hour parking law, and that the town has no funds with which to hire additional officers.
