## New Fall Fashions Shown In Paris

PARIS (AP)—Maugy Rouff, usually known for her staidness of design, surprised a packed press audience last night with a fall fashion collection which launched a variety of chic, wearable day dresses and delectable evening gowns.

She has rejected completely the "barrel" silhouette which the fashion tipsters are backing as the season's favorite.

Her silhouette, mainly on the princess line, is flattering and, for the nonconformist ones, easy to wear. It accentuates the waist and bust and allows graceful leg movement.

Most of her skirts have fullness falling from midhips, promoted by pressed or unpressed pleats and occasionally by gathers strung from a fitting hip yoke. Her shoulder span is wide and slightly rounded.

Necklines range from high sophisticated throat height to wedge and roundshaped, revealing lowness. Lengths are fairly static, jackets are knuckle length, skirts only slightly below the calf and evening gowns are an agreeable circle level.

The small color circle of beige, brown and green used for her suits, widens commendably for her day dresses, where she introduces robin-hood green, pale and deep mauve, pale banana and paperchain pink.

For evening wear she uses fuchsia and Chinese pink with black, smoke grey, and pastel greens, and lilac shades.

Evening gowns come with billowing semi-crinoline skirts, often with a contrasting petticoat peering from beneath the hemline, as well as intricately swathed Grecian drapery.

Hats were conspicuously absent from the entire collection.

Raphael, a short and bespectacled Spaniard, last night demonstrated the wide versatility of the tailored suit, even for evening wear, in unveiling his fall collection at a garden party at his home near the historic Versailles palace outside Paris.

Perfectly tailored suits, for which he is famous, took the lead in the collection. This season they come in a wide range of design, detail and color. The basic classical line is maintained, but in some instances he injects interest into the jackets with fluted and dropped pleatings.

Fur plays a tremendous part for trimming and lining, and scrollwork in velvet and jet takes its share of the honors.

One suit in dark smoke grey was trimmed with matching rat fur at the throat and pockets and opened to display a matching fur waistcoat beneath.
