

Hot Spell Forseen

Corn-Withering Weather Slated For Entire Area Between Mississippi River And Rocky Mountains

A new heat wave now covering Montana and the Southern plains states will spread over the entire area between the Mississippi river and the Rocky mountain region this afternoon and extend eastward tomorrow to blanket the lower Ohio river valley and the upper Great Lakes region.
Temperatures will soar to above the 100 mark in many localities, bringing new corn-withering weather to the Midwest, just recovering from a four-day hot spell earlier in the week.
The hot weather which developed yesterday in Montana and in the area from South Dakota and Southern Arkansas southward to the Gulf

of Mexico forced many temperatures to 100 degrees or higher in that region.
High readings included 108 at McAlester, Okla.; 107 at Pierre, S. D.; Dallas, Tex.; and Ponca City, Okla.; 106 at Shreveport, La., and 105 at Miles City, Mont.
Readings as high as 110 were forecast for South Dakota this afternoon as the hot air mass moves northeastward.
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 9 (AP)—A death toll of three, nearly 4000 acres of watershed burned out and a few danger spots along a 16-mile stretch yet to be stamped out today told the story of the forest and brush fire in Big Tujunga canyon, some 20 miles north of here.
More than 1000 firefighters remained on the job or ready for a recurrence of the blaze, the worst of the season in Southern California, that began roaring last Tuesday and was not pronounced under control until late yesterday.
Two firefighters met death in the inferno Tuesday, and an elderly resident, seeing the flames approaching his home, died of a heart attack. Yesterday Red Cross officials said approximately 200 firefighters suffered injuries, mostly minor burns.
A freak summer shower, high humidity and the valiant efforts of regular and volunteer firemen finally curbed the fire as it raged

through the Angeles National forest. In Northern California, where more than 20,000 acres of brush and forest lands have been scorched, forest service officials reported gains in their fight against widespread fires.
A blaze in the Truckee river canyon between Truckee, Calif., and Reno, Nev., apparently was under control. For a half hour yesterday the fire blocked traffic on U. S. Highway 40.
A four-day fire south of Markleeville in the Ebbetts canyon area still was out of control but a 40-mile wind that lashed it yesterday had subsided last night and the flames were moving away from the town.

Government Finishes Job Of Lining Up Top Flight Labor Officials On Posts

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—The government today had about completed the job of lining up its top-most labor officials for the uncertain new era ahead.
Five major federal labor appointments have been announced in little more than a week:
1. David A. Morse to be under-secretary of labor. Secretary Schweikert disclosed this selection yesterday, saying President Truman will make the appointment shortly. Morse will succeed Keen Johnson, resigned.
2. Cyrus S. Ching to be director of the new and independent federal mediation and conciliation service (FMCS).
3. Robert N. Denham to fill the powerful job of general counsel of the national labor relations board.
4. Abe Murdock and J. Copeland Gray to be new members of the NLRB.
Morse's appointment is the only one not growing out of the Taft-Hartley labor act which so drastically alters the government's role in the labor field.
But as the executive officer and number two man of the labor department, he will help administer the department's limited functions under the act, including that of receiving financial reports and other information from unions.
"Unions which want to use the machinery of the national labor relations board must file with labor department information on finances, officers' salaries, dues, initiation fees, etc."
Schweikert yesterday turned down a petition from a group of newsmen asking that this information be available to the press.
He said he had concluded that

can do so by coming to the labor department in person.
Significantly, all five of the big appointments are temporary. They must be approved by the republican-controlled senate when it meets in January. By that time GOP senate leaders may have a good idea whether they want to oppose any of the appointees.
Culer Funeral Services Today
COQUILLE, Aug. 9 (AP)—Funeral services will be held here today for P. W. Culer, 69, Coos county commissioner who died Thursday night

in a Myrtle Point hospital. Burial will be at Camas Valley.
Culer, a deputy sheriff of Coos county for 12 years, became commissioner in 1942. He was chief of police at Myrtle Point in 1922.
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Britain Set To Fire Questions At Soviets Concerning Atom Control

LAKE SUCCESS, Aug. 9 (AP)—A series of British questions for Moscow to answer concerning Russian views on atomic control injected new life today into the atomic negotiations which have been stymied by persistent United States-Russian disagreements.
Without fanfare, the British delegation to the United Nations atomic energy commission announced last night that it was submitting promptly to Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate, some questions which had been drawn up in London. They will be given to other delegates also before being made public.

Ambulance Service To Open Here

The Professional Ambulance service, a new service, will begin operation Monday morning, Ralph E. Rust, owner, announced today. The office will be at Rust's home, 810 California, phone 3479.
Rust arrived in town yesterday after driving his big red ambulance from the factory in Lima, O. The vehicle is fully equipped to handle four patients at a time, two stretchers and two sit-ups, and is also equipped with oxygen for serious cases.
The service will operate 24 hours a day, Rust said, and a surgical technician will accompany every patient. The ambulance is insured for \$50,000 to cover all passengers in case of accident to the vehicle.
Rust has been in the ambulance business for 12 years in Los Angeles and was a staff surgical technician for four years in the army. He sold out an ambulance service in Los Angeles to move here.
