

# Cards Gain Half Notch

## Brooklyn's Margin Sliced To 3 1/2 Games

Murry Dickson, the slight right-hander with the big heart, is one reason the St. Louis Cardinals are right in their fighting to retain their National league laurels.

The gritty little curveballer, currently pitching the best ball of his career, was the big man in the Cards' twin victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday which moved them to within three and a half games of the front running Brooklyn Dodgers. Dickson hurled a four-hit 5-0 shutout in the first game and saved a St. Louis 7-5 second game victory with an expert bit of relief pitching.

Southpaw Pitcher Joe Hatten and

Outfielder Dixie Walker combined to lead the Dodgers to a 2-0 triumph over the last place Philadelphia Phillies. Hatten limited the Phils to five hits to register his 11th victory. Brooklyn's lead is now 3 1/2 games.

The fourth place Boston Braves staged a two-out ninth inning rally to come from behind and defeat the New York Giants 7-5 in the second game of a doubleheader after the Giants had won the opener 6-2.

Clyde McCullough's eighth inning single with the bases loaded gave the Chicago Cubs a 4-3 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and the series, three games to one.

With all the runs scored in the ninth inning, the New York Yankees

alipped the Red Sox in Boston 3-1 to increase their American league lead over the second place Sox to 12 1/2 games.

Bobby Peller pitched a 6-0 victory over St. Louis in Cleveland as the Indians and Browns divided a doubleheader. The Browns won the second game 4-2. It was Peller's 14th victory and his fifth shutout. Jeff Heath's 21st home run with one on won for the Browns.

Ed Lopat pitched a seven-hitter as the Chicago White Sox dumped the Tigers 10-2 in Detroit.

The Athletics and Washington Senators split a doubleheader at Philadelphia, the A's winning the opener 3-2 and the Nats taking the second game 5-2.

# Carl Hubbell Had 24

While Ewell Blackwell of the Cincinnati Reds was hanging together his string of 16 straight wins a couple of weeks ago, much was written and said about the tall righthander being on his way toward the all-time major league record of 19 consecutive wins set by Tom Keefe back in 1888 and by Rube Marquard of the modern era in 1912. Both were of the Giants.

Let's get this straight once and for all. The all-time major league record of consecutive wins by a pitcher is not 19 at all, but 24, set by Carl Hubbell of the New York Giants in 1937-38.

The fact that the "meal ticket" string covers work in two years doesn't detract from it. He won 24 straight scheduled National league decisions.

Reason Hubbell's feat has been overlooked is that the record books operate on a seasonal basis. The National league's official records are put out by a private firm, the Elias Bureau of New York, and the firm's researchers didn't dig deeply enough to really establish the true straight-win mark.

It might well be that some of the other tossers who are listed as having won 16 or more straight did better than that over a two-season span. Maybe Keefe and Marquard have been an injustice. Perhaps also the 16 straight wins listed in the American league for Lefty Grove, Walter Johnson and Schoolboy Rowe might not be entirely accurate.

It's not the pitcher's fault if the season runs out on him.

# Rescue Try Ends In Death

COOS BAY, Ore., Aug. 11 (AP)—A passenger of a light plane that landed on the beach north of here drowned in the surf yesterday while attempting to swim to an overturned boat in which coast guardsmen later discovered the body of a fisherman.

The coast guard station at Coos Head reported the passenger, Pearl E. Wason, 35, Lebanon, had earlier attempted to investigate the boat wreckers, he and Pilot Frank Brown flew to a North Bend airport and obtained an oil can and rope. With that Wason again attempted to float to the boat, but disappeared in the surf.

The coast guard recovered Wason's body in the boat to which he was swimming the coast guard discovered the body of Roy Pierson, 52, Gardiner, Pierson's head and neck had caught in a fanbelt.

Coroner Brewer Mills said an autopsy would be made on the fisherman to determine whether he was strangled by the belt before the boat capsized or was drowned. He said the man apparently had been working on the engine.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, TO CONSTRUCT AND LAY SEWER IN THAT PORTION OF PRECINCT NO. 23 LYING TO THE NORTHWEST OF SOUTH SIXTH STREET, APPROXIMATE PLANS, SPECIFICATIONS AND ESTIMATES THEREFOR FILED BY THE CITY ENGINEER, DESCRIBING THE BOUNDARIES OF PROPERTY BENEFITED, AND DIRECTING CERTAIN STEPS BE TAKEN, SAID PROJECT TO BE KNOWN AS SEWER UNIT NO. 17.

The City Engineer of the City of Klamath Falls pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted having filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of constructing and laying what is to be known as the 17th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, located in that portion of Precinct No. 23, lying to the northeast of South Sixth Street, embracing said unit all of the property hereinafter bounded and described, and the Common Council having taken said plans, specifications and estimates under consideration and finding them satisfactory.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ASSEMBLED IN REGULAR SESSION AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1**  
That the plans, specifications and estimates for the construction and installation of what is to be known as the 17th sewer unit of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, heretofore filed with the City by the City Engineer, shall be, and the same are hereby approved and adopted.

**SECTION II**  
That the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, hereby declares its intention to construct and install the 17th Sewer Unit of said City in accordance with the said plans, specifications and estimates; that project consisting of constructing separate pipe sewers, together with all necessary manholes, lamp-holes, V. A. branches and necessary appurtenances for a complete sewer system, located in that portion of Precinct No. 23, lying to the northeast of South Sixth Street, in Klamath Falls, Oregon, by placing therein, vitrified sewer pipes with V. A. manholes, lamp-holes and the like or concrete sewer pipe made according to the specifications for concrete sewer pipes as more fully shown by the plans and specifications on file with the Police Judge of said City at a total estimated cost as follows, to-wit:

Cement sewer pipe \$11,871.75  
Vitrified sewer pipe \$12,584.99  
said estimates in either event to include engineering, attorney fees, supervision, advertising, clerical assistance and unforeseen contingencies.

**SECTION III**  
That the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described shall be benefited by the construction and installation of said sewer system.

Beginning at the intersection of the south line of Shasta Way and the west line of Washburn Way in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence west along the south line of Shasta Way to the northeast line of South 6th Street; thence southeast along South 6th Street to the west line of Washburn Way; thence along Washburn Way to the point of beginning.

Said real property above described

shall be and is hereby declared to be benefited and assessed for the expense of said sewer unit.

**SECTION IV**  
That Monday the 25th day of August, 1947, at the hour of 7:30 p. m. or soon thereafter, in the Council Chambers in the City Hall of Klamath Falls, Oregon, shall be and is hereby fixed as the time and place for hearing objections or remonstrances against the construction and installation of the said 17th sewer unit.
