

RFC Refuses Kaiser Cut

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—The reconstruction finance corporation, said Wednesday it has denied a request by Henry Kaiser that it cut \$5,000,000 off the unpaid balance on the purchase of his Fontana, Calif., steel plant.

The RFC made public a letter to Kaiser which said it is the judgment of its directors that they, "as trustees of public money, should not grant such reductions of a debt due the government . . . except by direction of congress."

The original RFC loan to Kaiser for the plant was \$125,000,000. Present RFC loan claims total \$105,000,000.

Pontana was a wartime project and Kaiser argued, the RFC said, that recent sale of the government-owned Geneva steel plant to the United States Steel corporation, its wartime operator, "established a formula for absorption of loss by the government" which should be applied to the Kaiser loan.

Oregon Girls In Office

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—A junior feminine version of the operations of the United States government, set up by high school girls from 44 states, honors two Pacific Northwest girls.

The get-together elected their own "president of the United States—George Ann Hicks, Edmond, Okla., high school student—yesterday and then picked other officers. They included Juanita Martin, Corbett, Ore., sergeant at arms.

Among the cabinet officers nominated by President Hicks and then approved by the senate was: Lillian Milson, Omak, Wash., secretary of state.

Discussions On British Loan To Start By Monday

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Snyder announced Wednesday that discussions will start Monday with British officials on easing terms of the \$3,750,000,000 American loan to Britain.

Snyder told a news conference that the national advisory council on international monetary problems, headed by himself, will conduct the discussions on behalf of this country.

The British delegation, which will fly here this week-end, will be headed by Sir Wilfred Eady, special assistant to Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton.

Indian Hearing Plans Talked

Members of the chamber of commerce Indian affairs and inter-city committees met Wednesday to draw up a suggested itinerary for the entertainment of the senate investigating committee which will be in Klamath Falls next week. Although final plans cannot be arranged until it is known what free time the senators will have, the committees have prepared a list of activities that the senators might undertake each evening after the adjournment of the hearings.

Tentative arrangements call for a dinner Monday evening at which the senators would be guests of the Klamath and Lake county courts. Tuesday evening would feature a trip to Crater lake with dinner at the park. The committee will have an opportunity to view Tulelake homesteads Wednesday evening if they can make a proposed trip through that area, stopping for dinner at the Sportsman's hotel.

Planes will be available for the senators if they wish to fly over the Klamath area. Such a trip would give them an over-all view of the reservation, Crater lake and the Tulelake section.

A committee composed of women members of the chamber of commerce will make arrangements to entertain families of the senators who may accompany them.

E. P. Ivory, Malcolm Epley, Arthur Rickbell and Charles Stark will meet with Hugh Brown, secretary of the investigating committee, to make final plans for the trips.

Hitchhiker Hangs Self

AUBURN, Calif., Aug. 14 (AP)—Sheriff E. J. Kenison of Placer county said Wednesday that Kenneth M. Simms, 21-year-old hitchhiker held on an armed robbery charge for the highway robbery of a lumber dealer, hanged himself in his county jail cell this morning.

Simms, formerly of Oklahoma City, was arrested by state highway patrolmen Sunday night with Walter Hurd, 21, formerly of Los Angeles, for robbing L. R. Hollenbeck of Richmond, Calif., and stealing his car on the highway west of Auburn.

Hollenbeck said he had picked up the pair on the highway in Nevada while driving to San Francisco. He telephoned an alarm and the two were arrested in Roseville Sunday night.

Sheriff Kenison said Simms had used glass from a broken light globe to cut strips from his blanket from which he fashioned a noose.

Case Attends Vet Officers School

T. D. Case of Klamath Falls attended the Oregon department of veterans' affairs service officers' school in Portland last week. The school was held primarily to acquaint Oregon's county officers with the latest information on regulations, benefits and other matters affecting the welfare of veterans and their dependents and beneficiaries.
