Group Defends Property Survey

PORTLAND, Aug. 14 (AP)—A formal statement was issued today by the Portland Home Builders' association approving a statement by its national president criticizing veterans' administration property appraisals.

E. R. Carr, Washington, D. C., president of the national association, declared earlier this week the VA appraisal policies were unfair to builders and discouraged them from erecting homes needed by veterans.

The Portland group's statement was in Carr's defense after comments by Portland mortgage firm spokesmen and others supporting the VA policies.

Helpful ideas for busy canning days

Can, jam, preserve, conserve—that accounts for the spicy fragrances now wafting from kitchen windows. These tips for canning with little to-do are for the busy homemaker with much to do.

...SAVE TIME: MAKE CHILI SAUCE AND TOMATO JUICE AT THE SAME TIME. Wash and quarter about 10 pounds tomatoes. Simmer until soft, about 30 minutes, with chopped celery, onion, green pepper, carrots and whole spices. (Tie spices loosely in cheesecloth bag, easy to remove.) Drain off juice and fill hot jars. Process in boiling water bath 35 minutes. Put tomatoes, celery, onion, green pepper and carrots through colander or food mill; add vinegar. Cook until pulp is thick enough to round up on spoon. Fill hot jars; process in boiling water bath 1 hour.

...KEEP CRYSTALS OUT OF GRAPE JELLY. Prepare juice and let stand overnight in refrigerator. Crystals form and settle to the bottom. Dip off juice, proceed with jelly making.

...BE PARTICULAR IF YOU WANT PRAISEWORTHY PICKLES! Use fresh spices—1 ounce whole mixed spices is enough for 4 gallons of pickles; soft water (soften hard water by boiling, letting stand 24 hours to settle), and good recipes.
