

Klamath County Demo Leaders Sight Four Men As Gubernatorial Candidates

Klamath county democratic leaders, talking over politics in a meeting at the courthouse last night, sighted four possible democratic candidates for governor of Oregon, all of them from Portland.

Election of a governor for two years, to fill out the unexpired term of the late Earl Snell, will take place next November, with the primary elections coming up May 21.

The four possible democratic candidates are:

1—Marshall Dana, editor of the Oregon Journal, who has never been a candidate for political office but who has been active in state party workings.

2—Joe Carson, long-time mayor

Tulelake

Tulelake Boy Scouts and Sea Scouts have undertaken the procurement, preparation and sale of Christmas trees in the Tulelake area for the coming season, proceeds to benefit their troop fund.

Sea Scouts have selected and cut the trees under supervision of the forest service and led by Skipper Bill Proctor. The Sea Scouts took trucks, axes and equipment to Glass mountain, November 16, and harvested 400 carefully selected evergreens. The trees were carefully stored below the snow line.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2 (AP)—Visible supply of wheat decreased 2,532,000 bushels to 124,945,000 bushels this week, the board of trade reported today. Corn increased 1,201,000 to 10,375,000 bushels, oats decreased 1,262,000 to 19,813,000, rye decreased 58,000 to 3,974,000, barley decreased 257,000 to 22,726,000 and soy beans increased 467,000 to 11,831,000.

Carson was prominently mentioned as a gubernatorial possibility in 1946, but declined to run. He now lives in Washington, D. C., but might return to Oregon to run for the state's top office.

3—Lew Wallace, state senator from Multnomah county and former member of the game commission. Wallace is known to be making a quiet play for the nomination and has recently been put forward by an "Independent Democrats" organization. Lew Wallace was the party candidate in 1942 and was defeated by Earl Snell.

4—Carl Donough, who was the democratic candidate for governor in 1946 and was defeated by Snell. The local democratic organization did not offer its support to any of the candidates, merely discussing them as possibilities. A fifth possibility, who has been receiving favorable mention over the state, was E. P. (Pat) Ivory of Klamath Falls. Ivory announced that he would not be a candidate for any public office.

The democrats plan to have a state-wide party meeting and banquet here January 31—"Roosevelt Day"—and W. Lamar Townsend is heading a committee working on that program. Party members from all over the state will be invited.

During last night's meeting the talk was kept mostly on state and national politics rather than on the local scene, and the current high cost of living was pointed out as the No. 1 democratic talking point in the coming presidential election.

Mention was made of the possible candidacy of Henry Semon, who is a registered democrat, for state senator, but the party organization is expected to wait until after the nominating primary before taking a stand for any candidate.

Northwest Ports Losing Trade

SEATTLE, Dec. 2 (AP)—Because a few Eastern and Midwest shippers realize more than vaguely that some of the world's finest ports are located in the Pacific Northwest, this area is losing possible Orient trade to California and gulf ports. Worth Fowler, assistant general traffic manager of the American Mail Line, asserts.

Fowler, condemning "half-hearted" promotion efforts by the Northwest, urged before the transportation committee yesterday that Seattle, Tacoma and Portland join in sending representatives to major shipping points "to battle it out with our chief competitors."

Wallgren Named In V-P Poll

CLEVELAND, Dec. 2 (AP)—Gov. Mon C. Wallgren finished third in a vice presidential preference poll conducted yesterday by the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the Dallas (Tex.) News among U. S. senate democrats.

Sen. Scott W. Lucas of Illinois topped the listings with eight votes, followed by Sen. Millard E. Tydings, Maryland, with seven, and Wallgren with three. Thirteen other ballots were scattered among 10 more selections.

Snow Slated For Eastern Oregon

SALEM, Dec. 2 (AP)—The state highway commission warned today that considerable snow is expected to fall tonight in the Cascade passes and over most of Eastern Oregon.

The roads today were almost normal, with frosty pavement on the Willamette highway, and packed snow on the Weston-Elgin route.

Postmaster Gives Out A Few Hints On Yule Cards

Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins today emphasized that your cheerful Christmas greetings won't come to grief in the dead letter office this year if your Christmas cards are sent by first-class mail, which entitles them to both forwarding and directory service.

"Each year we have to destroy a large number of beautiful Christmas cards because they are incorrectly addressed and carry only third-class postage," the postmaster said. "We are sorry to do it because we know each of these cards is intended to convey Christmas wishes to a special friend who will be disappointed and puzzled at not receiving a card."

Postal regulations, of course, are the explanation. They do not require that more than one effort be made to deliver third-class mail because it is being carried at a lower postal rate. So if the address is wrong and there's only a 1-cent stamp on the envelope, your carefully-selected Christmas card is carried back to the post office and dumped unceremoniously into the dead letter bin.

Undeliverable third-class mail is not returned to the sender, so you never know whether some of your Christmas cards go askew—and whether that's the reason Aunt Lilly suddenly stopped writing to you after last Christmas.

The postmaster pointed out that only first-class mail may be forwarded from one address to another. Cards bearing a 3-cent

stamp are also entitled to "directory service," which means that skilled post office clerks will seek to trace down addresses who have moved since you made out your Christmas card list last year. These clerks also try to figure out whether you mean "Elm street" when you addressed a card to a non-existent number on "Oak avenue," and they are experts at deciphering obscured or almost-illegible handwriting.

"Only cards that are sent first-class may be sealed," the postmaster said. "You are permitted to sign your name on a card sent third-class, but if you decide to write a few cheery lines to an old friend or tuck in a little social note, be sure to put a 3-cent stamp on the envelope."

Every year some cards also are returned to senders because the stamps fell off en route, he reported. "Don't just give stamps a lick and a pat," he requested. "Affix them firmly."

The postmaster asked that all Christmas cards and packages for out-of-state delivery be in the mails by December 10, and that local cards be mailed by December 15.

Restaurants Given Grade

All but three of the eating places in the city of Klamath Falls have now been graded, J. V. Hawkins, city sanitarian, said today. Of the total of 64, grade A has been given to 23 establishments, 36 are grade B and two grade C.

The survey includes not only restaurants, but boarding houses, ice cream parlors and doughnut shops.

The three ungraded include two places which have not been in operation long and the place where city prisoners are fed.

Basis of grading is an inspection sheet which is an abbreviated form of the city ordinance setting minimum requirements for eating places, and an A classification is given to places which meet most of the essential sanitary requirements. Grade B places do not meet essential requirements, Hawkins said, and the health department is making an effort to have grade B and C establishments improve their standards.

There is a total of 141 eating places in Klamath county, but the ones outside the city limits were not included in this survey.
