

Romanian Prince To Be Married

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Dec. 1 (AP)—Dashing young King Mihai I of Romania and beautiful Princess Anne of Bourbon-Parma, his distant cousin, will announce their engagement probably within a month, a source close to the Danish royal family said today.

The 24-year-old Danish-French princess, who once worked in a hat shop in New York with her royal mother, and 26-year-old Mihai are together now in Switzerland. They arrived Sunday from London after attending the marriage of Princess Elizabeth.

The British royal wedding had revived rumors of a romance between Mihai and Elizabeth's sister, Princess Margaret Rose. Mihai's name also had been linked with that of Princess Theora, member of a

family which claims the non-existent throne of Brazil.

King Mihai's secretary, advised in Lausanne of the report, said "We have to wait for an announcement from the government." The king and the princess are staying at the Hotel Beau Rivage in Gouchy, a fashionable Lausanne suburb. With them are the king's mother, Queen Helen, and his aunt, the Duchess of Assola. The king's secretary said the king planned to leave at the end of this week for Bucharest and that Princess Anne expected to return then to Copenhagen.

While they were in London Mihai and Anne were seen together frequently. The informant said it was expected the engagement would be announced simultaneously by King Mihai in Bucharest, King Frederik IX of Denmark and Princess Anne's parents, Prince Henri and Princess Margarethe, in Copenhagen.

Freight Hike Hurts Farmer

SEATTLE, Dec. 2 (AP)—Asserting that farmers are struck a "double blow" by increased freight rates, Henry H. Rathbun, New York City, chairman of the national agricultural cooperative's transportation committee, yesterday urged farmers to unify their opposition to such boosts.

Rathbun said higher freight rates hit the farmer a double blow by increasing the price of items they must buy for production purposes, and by cutting net returns from the sale of their product.

"The fact that marketing costs, which include transportation, are 67 per cent higher today than they were in the pre-war period is a serious thing to the farm people we represent," he told the 25 members assembled here for the committee's annual meeting.

He charged that "agriculture articles has paid more than its share of the national freight bill, just as farmers always have received less

than their fair share of the national income."

New officers named to head the national committee's North Pacific regional division are A. P. Lamb, Salem, Ore., chairman, and John Coe, Sumner, Wash., secretary.

Son Spots Father's Body In Ocean

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Dec. 2 (AP)—Herbert Krausnick, 27, put a dime in the slot of a pay telescope at Point Fermin yesterday, looked for a while and then spotted the body of his father floating in the ocean.

The son reported his find to the coast guard and when the body was brought ashore identified it as that of his father, Fritz Krausnick, 57, a scenic artist and film set designer, who had been missing since Sunday. Herbert had joined his mother in searching for the elder Krausnick.

Detective Lewis Donald Gray said Ralph Lewant said they were investigating the case and that an autopsy will be performed.

CAA Probes Fatal Crash

SEATTLE, Dec. 2 (AP)—A double-edged investigation into the Sunday crash of an Alaska Air Lines transport, and the resulting death of eight persons, continued today with Leon D. Cuddeback, regional chief of the civil aeronautics administration, asserting that investigators have yet to determine:

1 Whether the plane landed within a safe stopping distance from the end of the runway; 2 Whether there was any functional failure of the large aircraft.

The plane, a DC-4 inbound from Alaska, overran the end of the Seattle-Tacoma airport runway, plowed about 175 feet through mud and plunged over a sharp bank on to a passing automobile.

Pilot James E. Farris, 37, of Seattle, yesterday attributed the crash to failure of the plane's hydraulic brakes. He said the plane "rolled like it was on a bed of ball-bearings" and then leaped a 60-foot embankment at the end of the airport runway.

In Washington, the civil aeronautics board ordered the company to show cause by December 15 why it should not be required to stop scheduled operations between Anchorage and Seattle. The board said its enforcement section asserted the carrier was providing scheduled service between points not on its established routes and particularly between Seattle and Anchorage.

In addition to the eight dead, two others of the 28 passengers aboard the plane continued to be hospitalized in critical condition.

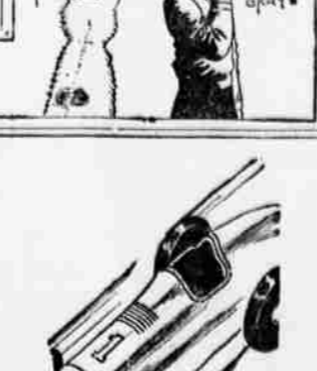
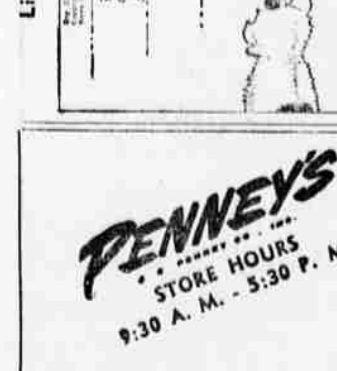
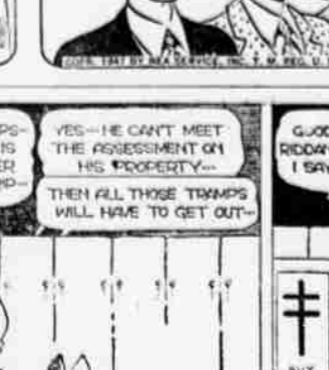
