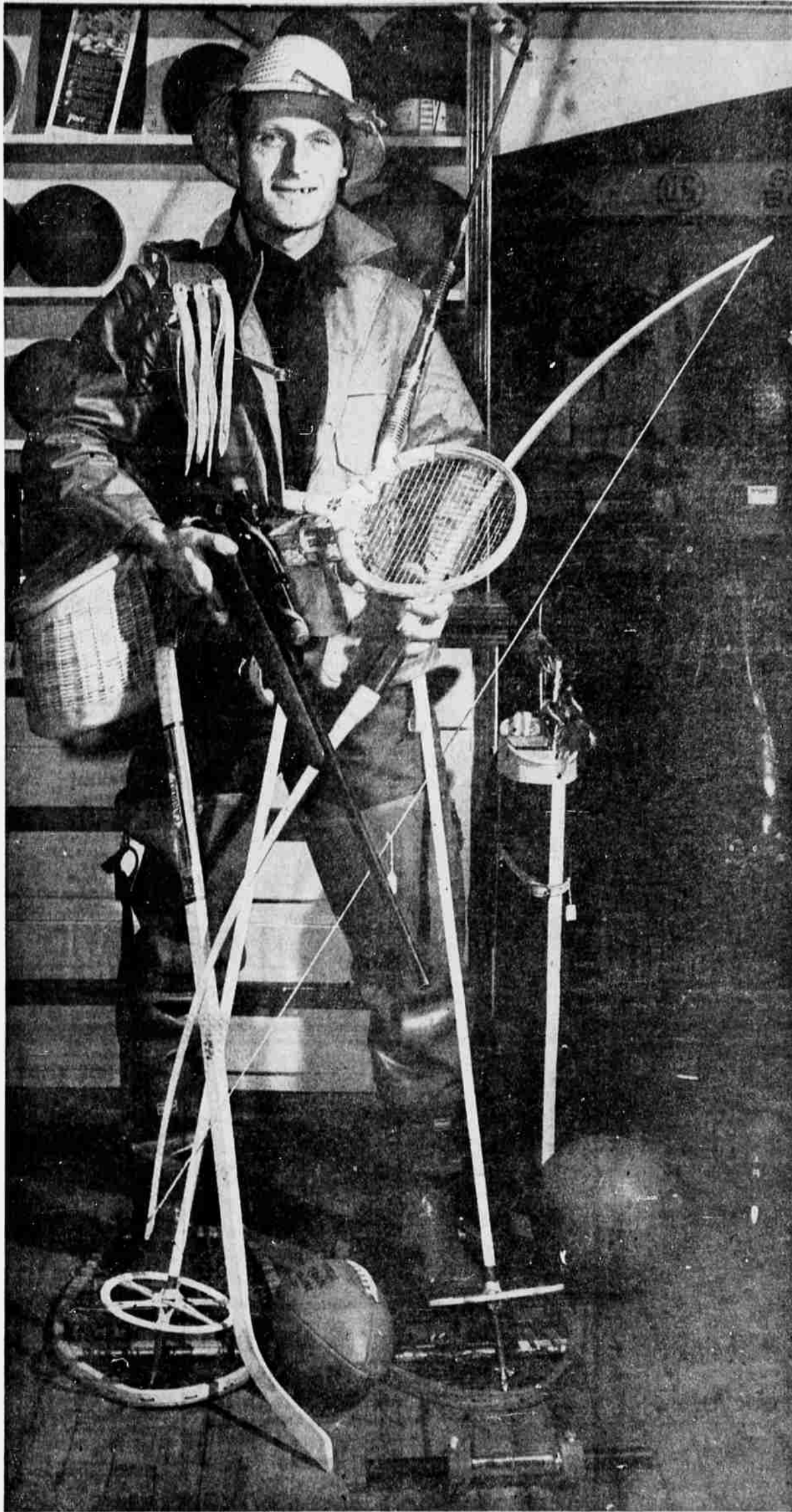


The Sportsman ----- Ready For Anything



There's so much to do in a sporting way around the Klamath country that a guy (like the fellow in the picture) has to observe the Boy Scout motto and be prepared for anything. Take Jack Fitzgerald, for instance. This is purely a gag shot designed to show what's on the market in the sporting goods line, but Jack has over \$350 worth of equipment in sight. And that doesn't count a good pocket knife in his hip pocket.

Buying sporting goods for your man's Christmas is doing the shopping the easy way, because a fellow can have been at his favorite sport for years and still not have all the equipment he might need on occasion. Besides, part of the fun of being a hunter or fisherman is the accumulation of a room full of tackle.

Nobody thinks of going fishing with just a pole and a hook any more, or hunting with just a shotgun and a pocketful of shells. It's much more complicated than that.

Sporting equipment is rather expensive this Yule season—but so is everything else. For instance:

The rifle in the picture will nick the buyer about \$135

and the telescopic sight anywhere from \$10 to \$60. Casting or fly rods run on up the scale to maybe \$35-\$40 each, with reels extra. Skis are selling for from \$6.95 to \$25 a pair. Golf clubs from \$19.50 to way on up a set.

Here are some of the other price ranges for articles shown in the photograph:

- Fishing hat—49c to \$2.50.
- Duck straps—49c to \$4.95.
- Hunting coats—\$4.95 to \$12.50.
- Wicker creels, with leather trim—\$3.45 to \$12.50.
- Hip-length fishing boots—\$10.50 to \$24.50.
- Snowshoes—\$17.50 a pair.
- Gun belts—\$1.50 to \$7.95.
- Holsters—\$1.50 to \$12.50.
- Ski poles—\$1.95 to \$7.95.
- Bow and arrow sets—\$1.50 to \$25.

The sporting goods stores in town have laid in a fine assortment of items which are suggested buying for Christmas gifts, including a lot of things the man of the family has been wanting but hasn't felt like he could get this year.

Hunters To Have Christmas Shoot

For the first time in many a year the Klamath-Tulelake area of the Pacific waterfowl flyway is to have a shooting season covering the Christmas and New Year's holidays and, given a decent break in the weather, the hunting might be good. In setting up the waterfowl regulations this year, the U. S. fish and wildlife service decided upon a split season to scatter hunters and possibly lessen the annual bird kill. First half of the season in this area

ran from October 21 to November 3 and was not particularly satisfactory to hunters.

The second half opens at noon December 23 and runs through January 5. When the split season was announced, many sportsmen viewed the decision as a move to cut the Klamath-Tulelake country out of half of its shooting, protesting that the December-January few days was just too late for any kind of bird hunting here.

It may be. The weather will decide. Right now there are plenty of ducks and geese here around the water and grain-stubble fields. If the weather continues mild and without excess snow, the shooting may be much better this second half than it was the first.

But if the mercury sags, snow covers the fields and the ponds freeze over, the main flocks of transient birds will move along south. The home-grown ducks and geese will stay around, but the migratory swarms will head for a place where food and rest is easier to find. Years ago when not much thought was given to regulation of duck hunting, the season used to be spread over much of the fall and winter and hold right on through the Yule holidays. But in recent years bird season has been shortened consistently and usually from the late end. So that a shooting season during the holidays such as is coming up this winter is a novelty.

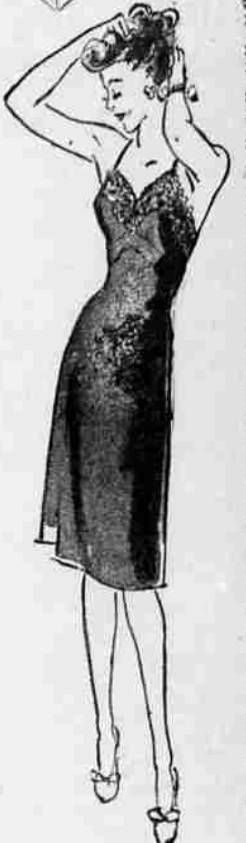
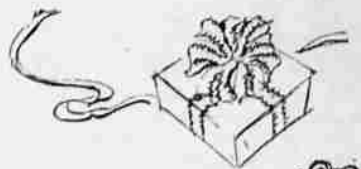
