A seasonal outbreak of chicken pox was noted in Klamath county the week of November 22 when 10 cases were reported to the Oregon state health department. The number of cases is not serious, health office authorities say, since the disease is always evident in the winter months of the school year.

The Oregon Health Bulletin, published by the health department, adds that for the same week there was one case of pneumonia, two of mumps and one of scarlet fever in the county. The figures are based on the reports of 89 doctors in Klamath county.

## New Motel Slated Here

Purchase of a 160-foot frontage on Main between Payne and Conger was announced today by Keith Cobo, formerly of Burlingame, Calif., who is laying plans for early construction of a 25-unit motel.

The property was purchased from E. A. Dunham of Klamath Falls, with a section facing Conger bought from Anna Tindall of Ukiah, Calif., and two city-owned lots from the city of Klamath Falls. Purchase price was in the neighborhood of \$23,000 for all pieces, Cobo said.

A local architect will be named to draw up plans for the motel which will be completed by late summer. Style of architecture is yet to be decided upon, Cobo said, but the entire plan will stress the locality, the history of Linkville and take advantage of the view of Link river and Lake Ewauna. Interested in the venture is Cobo, his mother, Mrs. Nora M. Cobo, and his sister, Mrs. Dorothy C. Wicks, the two latter now in Burlingame. They will come here when operation of the motel is started.

Cobo came here from Burlingame where he operated the Bayshore motel for 16 years. He has disposed of his interests there. He served as secretary-treasurer of United Motor Courts, a cooperative association of better class motels, for three years prior to the war.
