

Sam Anderson Named To Head Tulelake Growers; Edgar Osborn Secretary

TULELAKE, Calif., Dec. 3.—Tulelake Growers organization opened a new year at a banquet that filled the American Legion hall here last night, and saw the inauguration of Sam Anderson as president, succeeding Chet Main, who has headed the organization since its inception six years ago.

Main was presented with a hand-

some gold watch as a token of appreciation for his leadership and hard work in the formative years of the association that is now considered one of the most successful groups of its kind in California. Dan Crawford, who has served as secretary with Main, was also accorded expressions of appreciation.

New secretary of the group is Edgar Osborn. Edgar J. Duckett and Bill Kandra were elected to the board, succeeding Fred McMurphy and Lee Dixon.

Dinner Served

The program, which started with a sumptuous dinner served by the guild of the Community Presbyterian church, featured two outstanding addresses and music by the Klamath chapter of the Association for the Preservation and Enjoyment of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America.

Harry McClelland, vice president of the Bank of America, told the group that agriculture in this area faces a favorable long range outlook because tremendous markets are developing "at your very front door." He spoke of the huge growth of the population of the West, especially California, as developing consuming power for all agriculture can produce. "It's the biggest market in history," he said. Dr. D. J. Ferguson, Presbyterian minister of Mills City, who formerly lived at Tulelake and Merrill, gave an inspiring address on America's place in world destiny.

Sid Carmine, manager of the Kern County Potato Growers association, brought greetings from that organization, and told of determined efforts to fight freight rate increases. He said that if a general increase is granted, it is hoped to exempt California potatoes from the boost.

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Idle Benefits Show Big Gains

SALEM, Dec. 3 (AP)—Oregon unemployment benefits in November totaled \$527,058, a gain of 20 per cent over October, and 19 per cent more than in November, 1946, the state unemployment compensation commission said today.

The number of jobless claims jumped from 7589 to 16,157 in six weeks because of the end of many seasonal jobs.

Readjustment allowances to veterans totaled \$319,768 in November, 71 per cent more than in October, but 19 per cent less than in November, 1946.

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Snow Covers Passes Over State Today

Snowstorms struck all mountain passes in Oregon last night and Klamath residents awoke to find a light blanket of snow covering ground and rooftops. The snow lay over a slick glaze and several minor accidents were reported by motorists.

Ice and packed snow on all roads at higher elevations was the report of the Oregon state highway department this morning.

Two inches of new snow, bringing a total of 12 inches of roadside snow, was reported at Odell lake on the Willamette highway with packed snow from Salt Creek falls to Crescent Lake junction. Both sanders and snowplows were operating. Temperature was 32 degrees, an even freezing, at 9 a. m.

On the Sun mountain stretch of The Dalles-California highway, the temperature fell to 26 degrees, there was four inches of new snow and eight inches of roadside with roads slick. On the Greensprings highway it was 30 degrees, skies were reported overcast in the area, with one and one-half inches of new snow. The road was slippery, the highway commission added.
