

Lake Sportsmen Will Attend Game Probe

A delegation of sportsmen from Lakeview will be on tonight to appear before the legislative interim committee on wildlife resources, holding a public hearing at 8 p.m. in the Willard.

The committee, of which John Efinger of Klamath Falls is a member, is conducting hearings over the state in an effort to put a

finger on the ill of the state game commission. After the sessions it will be the job of this committee to work out proposals to the state legislature for the betterment of hunting and fishing in Oregon.

As the meeting is public, anyone with anything to say or offer about the workings of the game commission is welcome to have his say. Carl Petach of the Lake county sportsmen's association said that his group would be represented at tonight's hearing, and two local sports organizations will also be officially present.

One local project which is likely to come up is the re-opening of fishing in Odell lake where many persons are anxious to see the game commission plant Kamloops trout. Deer and bird seasons and limits will also be talked, as well as the stocking of lakes and streams of the area.

After the session here, the committee will go on to Bend for another session, and will cover several cities in Eastern Oregon in the next two weeks.

Wallgren said the democratic party "will be more solid in the

coming campaign than at any time in many years," and added: "We will work together to elect democratic officials to all positions for the good of the state."

The governor's prediction was made during the course of a talk attended by a capacity crowd of 500 persons at the chamber of commerce dining room. It was broadcast on a state network.

Suds Hurt By Prices Of Talent

SEATTLE, Dec. 5 (AP)—Seattle's baseball moguls reported from Miami today that the pickings are slim in their hunt for player reinforcements for the 1948 Pacific Coast league season.

And inflationary prices have spread to the player market. General Manager Earl Sherry, Vice President Rosco Torrance and Manager Jo Jo White reported the asking price is \$15,000 for mediocre hitters and pitchers with win averages below .500.

The trio reported: 1 The "working agreement" with Detroit has not been completed. Detroit has found it does not have players available to fulfill its end of the proposed agreement.

2 The Rainiers have purchased Her Karpel, a left-handed pitcher from Newark.

3 Detroit has been able to promise delivery of only two players, Pitcher Johnny Gorsica and Earl Rapp, a hard-hitting outfielder from Buffalo. Acquisition of an experienced second baseman, Lamarr (Skeeter) Newsome, by the Seattle Rainiers was announced today by General Manager Earl Sherry in Miami. Newsome, longtime big league infielder, recently was released by the Philadelphia Nationals and signed by Seattle as a free agent. He is 36 and batted .229 in 95 games last year.

back last year, and Bill Jesse, another academy player who was a reserve pivot man.

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
