KLAMATH FALLS AND VICINITY—Fair with some high cloudiness tonight and Saturday; high today 45; low tonight 28. High Saturday 32.

OREGON—Partly cloudy to cloudy today, tonight and Saturday with snow showers in northeast tonight and Saturday. Continued cold with freezing temperatures except near coast. Most areas northerly winds off coast.

Edward Wesley Stough, 58, a Klamath pioneer and member of an old Keno family, died suddenly at the family home, 2219 E. 2nd, on the night of December 1, and final rites will be held Saturday at 1:30 p. m. from the chapel of the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home.

Mr. Stough's son, Wesley, arrived Thursday from Philadelphia where he has been on duty with the U. S. navy. Interment will take place in the family plot at Picard cemetery, Davis.

Mr. Stough was born on the Klamath river below Keno and close to the California line, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elias Stough who settled in that section in the early opening of the district. His mother was a member of the Way family, old Klamath pioneers. Mr. Stough had been employed since 1928 with the Oregon state highway department and at the time of his death was relief watchman and yardman at the Altamont shops. Pallbearers will be fellow employees and old friends.

In addition to his wife, Pearl, and son Wesley, Mr. Stough is survived by another son, Glen W., of this city, four sisters and two grandchildren. The Rev. Victor Phillips, pastor of the First Methodist church, will officiate at final rites tomorrow.

Youth Held For Car Theft

A good looking, 24-year-old army man who has been here in the past three weeks cutting quite a swath in a 1946 sedan, was held in the Klamath county jail today following his arrest by state police last night on a charge of possession of stolen property and no operator's license.

The youth, PFC Salvatore Pallante, alias Jim Bradley, was arrested on Madison street near the home of a girl friend whose father became suspicious of the stories told by the glib New Jersey army man. Under questioning, Pallante admitted to taking a car owned by Mrs. John Hull of Washington, D. C., the machine he was driving when picked up. Pallante said he was on a 12-day furlough with permission to transport the car for Mrs. Hull to her husband, Col. Hull, at Fitzsimons General Hospital in Denver, Colo. As he reached the Colorado line in early November, he veered north and took in Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon and California, returning here three weeks ago. He has been living at a rooming house on Pine street.

Pallante said he had served overseas in the army, but 18 months of that time had been spent in the guardhouse, state police reported. He was given a bad conduct discharge, but reenlisted in the army the same day. He again attained the rank of private first class and was on duty in Washington when
